

Peña, by request 1 RESOLUTION 2 ADOPTING THE FY 2026 - FY 2027 TWO-YEAR URBAN ENHANCEMENT 3 TRUST FUND PROGRAM AND APPROPRIATING FUNDS FOR THE URBAN 4 ENHANCEMENT PROGRAM'S PROJECTS. 5 WHEREAS, the Mayor and the Urban Enhancement Trust Fund Board have 6 formulated the Urban Enhancement Program for the City of Albuquerque, in 7 conformance with Sections 4-2-1-1 through 4-2-1-3 ROA 1994; and 8 WHEREAS, the development of the Urban Enhancement Program describes 9 the proposed uses of the Urban Enhancement Trust Fund ("UETF") earnings 10 anticipated during the upcoming two fiscal years; and WHEREAS, the Two-Year Program's projects will significantly benefit the Bracketed/Underscored Material] - New quality of life of the City of Albuquerque. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL, THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF **ALBUQUERQUE:** Section 1. That the UETF Board shall work with the Department of Arts and Culture to develop the Resiliency Residence III program for artists, including fiscal sponsorship funding criteria, application requirements, and final award amount for each artist, in a manner that furthers the diversity, equity, inclusion and access initiatives undertaken within the UETF funding framework, as part of the FY26-27 regular funding cycle. Section 2. That the Two-Year program, FY2026 and FY2027, for the Urban Enhancement projects is approved. 23 Section 3. SUBJECT: Resolution Adopting the Fiscal Year 2026-2027 Urban Enhancement Trust Fund

Program and Appropriating Funds for the Urban Enhancement Program's Projects

The Urban Enhancement Trust Fund Board solicited proposals from arts and cultural organizations for the regular FY 2026-2027 funding cycle. Seventy-Eight (78) eligible applications for programs were received and the Urban Enhancement Trust Fund ("UETF") Board recommended thirty (30) projects for award of contracts for services. The total amount, to be awarded is Two Hundred Ninety Nine Thousand Three Hundred Dollars (\$299,300) plus an 8% indirect overhead of Twenty Three Thousand Nine Hundred Forty Four Dollars (\$23,944) for a total of Three Hundred Twenty Three Thousand Two Hundred Forty Four Dollars (\$323,244). Additionally, the UETF Board has recommended the funding of a third round of the incredibly successful UETF Resiliency Residency Program for artists' projects to be selected through an open competition for both fiscal sponsors and actual artists proposals. The total amount of the Resiliency Residency Program is Ninety-Six Thousand Dollars (\$96,000) plus 8% indirect overhead of Seven Thousand Six Hundred Eighty Dollars (\$7,680), for a total of One Hundred Three Thousand Six Hundred Eighty Dollars (\$103,680). The total appropriation for this legislation is Four Hundred Twenty Six Thousand Nine Hundred Twenty-Four Dollars (\$426,924). This legislation will appropriate funds for both of the Board recommended and Department supported programs.

The attached Resolution is forwarded to City Council for approval.

Cover Analysis

1. What is it?

Resolution to appropriate Urban Enhancement Trust Funds for contracts for services with non-profit arts and cultural organizations for fiscal years 2026 and 2027.

2. What will this piece of legislation do?

This Resolution will appropriate the interest earnings from the Urban Enhancement Trust Fund for FY 2026-27 as reviewed, evaluated and recommended by the Urban Enhancement Trust Fund Board and city staff, per R.O.A. 1994, Sections 4-2-1-1 through 4-2-1-3.

3. Why is this project needed?

By ordinance the Urban Enhancement Trust Fund was established to "to enhance and enrich the culture of the city."

4. How much will it cost and what is the funding source?

The recommended award for contracts for services with arts and cultural organizations will be in the amount of \$299,300 for UETF projects and \$96,000 for the Resiliency Residency Program, including \$31,624 for indirect overhead, for a total of \$426,924 out of the UETF interest earnings and fund balance.

5. Is there a revenue source associated with this contract? If so, what level of income is projected?

No, the contracts for services with arts and cultural organizations will not yield revenue for the city. The source of the funds for the contracts are trust fund earnings, per R.O.A. 1994, Sections 4-2-1-1 through 4-2-1-3.

6. What will happen if the project is not approved?

Non-profit arts and cultural organizations will not move forward with special programming projects that were asked for through a city-issued request for proposals.

- I. Call to Order/Native Land Acknowledgement: J. Youngs called the meeting to order at 11:33am and read a Native Land Acknowledgment.
- **II. Approval of Agenda:** E. Werner pointed out the addition of the Vacant Dist. 9 following the resignation of A. Lipman. J. Matthews moved to approve the agenda as corrected, J. Hoffman seconded. The motion was approved unanimously.
- **III.** Approval of January 24, 2025 Meeting Minutes J. Hoffman moved to approve the minutes as presented, M. Schmidt seconded. The motion was approved unanimously.
- **IV. Public Comment** L. Fleming, the current UNM Arts Leadership and Business student interning in the Public Art Urban Enhancement Division introduced himself. The Board welcomed L. Fleming to the meeting and thanked him for attending.

- ٧. Overview of FY 2026-27 Scores S. Brueggemann thanked staff members E. Werner and M. Matishak for their management of the applications and distribution to the Board members for review, and explained the process going forward with review of the scores, which includes the opportunity for individual Board members to adjust their scoring based on discussion that occurs. M. Matishak walked the Board through four different scoring iterations, which includes a version that gives a 5% score boost to organizations who have not received any City of Albuquerque money over the last two fiscal years. The Board discussed ways to elevate smaller organizations who may not have the resources, experience, or staff to submit an application that can compete with a larger organization. M. Schmidt suggested distinguishing a pool of money for the legacy organizations and a separate pot for the new and emerging. S. Brueggemann shared that many view the UETF logo as a "good housekeeping seal of approval" so it is a desirable thing for many organizations to have, even if it does not add a significant amount to their overall budget. M. Matishak suggested that going forward, large legacy organizations and small emerging ones are reviewed separately as a way to mitigate application quality disparities affecting reviewers' perceptions and scores. After more review and discussion of the scoring iterations, J. Hoffman moved to approve the sheet "all scores with 5% boost" as the scores moving forward into secondary review, S. Allen seconded the motion. The motion was approved unanimously.

Proposals for projects must be submitted by an arts and cultural organization, collective, or community group that is a not for profit, tax exempt 501(c)3 or in partnership with one.

The FY 2026-2027 cycle of the Urban Enhancement Trust Fund seeks to provide funding to projects that address the needs of the diverse communities that comprise the City of Albuquerque. This two-year funding cycle will prioritize projects that positively impact residents, neighborhoods and communities by providing direct access and increased opportunities for quality cultural activities and programming by, for, and about a broad representation of our city's population.

The two-year funding cycle will begin July 1, 2025 (CABQ Fiscal Year 2026) and end June 30, 2027 (CABQ Fiscal Year 2027). Favorable consideration will be given to organizations who have not; received City Council non-recurring funds or a UETF regular cycle grant.

We welcome and encourage all arts and cultural organizations, and non-arts organizations nonprofits in partnership with an arts and cultural organization to submit projects that benefit Albuquerque's diverse population in the areas of music, theater, dance, creative writing, visual art, performance art, installation, photography, film, teaching artists, arts education, culturally-based craft workers and culture bearers. Priority will be given to projects which enhance cultural development in, or are led by people from historically underserved communities.


