	23	Section 1. A new Part 19 is hereby added to Chapter 2, Article 6 of the
	24	Revised Ordinances of Albuquerque, New Mexico, 1994, establishing the Route
	25	66 Visitors Center Commission as follows:
	26	"[§ 2-6-19-1 SHORT TITLE.

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1	This Ordinance may be cited as the "Route 66 Visitors Center Commission
2	Ordinance."
3	§ 2-6-19-2 MISSION AND GOALS.
4	(A) Route 66 Visitors Center Mission. The Route 66 Visitors Center, an
5	interactive cultural center, is a public-private partnership between the City of
6	Albuquerque and local non-profits and local businesses, managed by the City
7	of Albuquerque's Arts and Culture Department, dedicated to preserving the
8	history of the country's longest urban stretch of Route 66 that is the only
9	location where the route crosses itself and educating both the residents and
10	visitors of Albuquerque about the role that the Historic corridor plays in
11	economic and community development.
12	(B) Route 66 Visitors Center Goals.
13	(1) To carry out the original vision of the community members who
14	first conceptualized the Route 66 Visitors Center in the 1990's.
15	(2) To provide a vibrant cultural hub and economic anchor for the
16	Route 66 related events and celebrations, including the upcoming Route 66
17	Centennial Celebration.
18	(3) To provide a culturally and historically relevant location for
19	launching programs and events to celebrate the legendary Route 66 corridor.
20	(4) To serve as a community workspace designed to inspire
21	collaboration, creativity, and productivity among freelancers, entrepreneurs,
22	startups, and remote workers who are producing products and services that
23	elevate Route 66 a history related to the development of the center.
24	(5) To serve as an archive of research and oral history materials
25	accessible to the public and Route 66 stakeholders for the purpose of
26	education, preservation, and management of the historic Route 66 corridor.
27	(6) To reflect the diversity and richness of the City and the State's
28	culture and history related to Route 66.
29	(7) To serve as a catalyst for tourism-related business along West
30	Central, including helping stimulate private and public investment, create jobs
31	and bring greater prosperity to the West Side, and all of Albuquerque.
32	(8) To seek maximum support and cooperation from government,

industry, academia, and private institutions.

§ 2-6-19-3 COMPOSITION OF THE COMMISSION.

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1	(C) Recommend and establish an annual fee schedule for renting the
2	facilities in the Route 66 Visitors Center; this includes developing a fee
3	schedule that offers meeting spaces for free to neighborhood associations
4	and community groups who might not have sufficient funding to access other
5	meeting spaces;
6	(D) Determine that Route 66 Visitors Center collections are maintained
7	and preserved in accordance with professional standards for museum
8	operations and the public interest; and establish policies for the control,
9	acquisition, and disposal of Route 66 Visitors Center materials;
10	(E) Recommend and establish appropriate contractual arrangements
11	between the City and contractors providing services to the Route 66 Visitors
12	Center; and
13	(F) Act as a forum for communication, education, and dialogue with
14	Albuquerque residents and visitors about Route 66 history and culture as well
15	as the role that Route 66 plays in economic development along Central
16	Avenue in Albuquerque.]"
17	SECTION 2. COMPILATION. SECTION 1 of this Ordinance shall amend, be
18	incorporated in, and made part of the Revised Ordinances of Albuquerque,
19	New Mexico, 1994 as a new Part 19 in Chapter 2, Article 6, titled, "Route 66
20	Visitors Center Commission."
21	SECTION 3. SEVERABILITY. If any section, paragraph, sentence, clause,
22	word or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or
23	unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not
24	affect the validity of the remaining provisions of this Ordinance. The Council
25	hereby declares that it would have passed this Ordinance and each section,
26	paragraph, sentence, clause, word, or phrase thereof irrespective of any
27	provision being declared unconstitutional or otherwise invalid.
28	SECTION 4. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall take effect five days
29	after publication by title and general summary.
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
