	19	§ 9-11-3-1 FINDINGS. The City council finds that:

	21	Delta-8 THC, Delta-10 THC and THC-A, poses significant risks to public health

2	23	(B) Intoxicating cannabinoids derived from hemp can mimic the effects of

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- (C) Federal law permits the sale of hemp-derived cannabinoids that contain less than 0.3% Delta-9 THC but does not adequately regulate the conversion of hemp into intoxicating products, creating a 'derivatives loophole.'
- (D) Young people are particularly vulnerable to the marketing and sale of intoxicating hemp products, which are often indistinguishable from legal, nonintoxicating hemp products and are not subject to the same marketing scrutiny as those in the regulated recreational and medical cannabis market.
- (E) It is in the public interest to regulate the sale and distribution of intoxicating hemp products to ensure public safety, discourage misuse, and promote compliance with existing laws.
- 11 (F) The New Mexico Cannabis Regulation Act does not comprehensively 12 address the use, tracking, or testing of intoxicating hemp products intended 13 for sale within the state's recreational and medical cannabis market.
- 14 § 9-11-3-2 SHORT TITLE. This article may be cited as the "Intoxicating Hemp
- 15 Products Ordinance."
- § 9-11-3-3 DEFINITIONS. As used in this section, unless the context otherwiserequires:
 - (A) ADVERTISE. To publish or disseminate an Advertisement.
 - (B) ADVERTISEMENT. Any written or verbal statement, illustration, or depiction that a reasonable person would understand as intended to induce sales, including any written, printed, graphic, or other material; billboard, sign, or other outdoor, digital, indoor, or point-of-sale display, including, without limitation, an individual carrying a display; other periodical, literature, or publication; or any similar media.
 - (C) CANNABINOIDS. Structured chemical compounds found in cannabis plants, including both THC and CBD.
 - (D) CANNABIDIOL (CBD). A type of substance identified using CAS Common Chemistry Registry Number 13956-29-1, including cannabidiolic acid.
 - (E) INDUSTRIAL HEMP or HEMP [means the plant cannabis sativa L. and any part of that plant, including seeds and all derivatives, extracts, cannabinoids, isomers, acids, salts and salts of isomers, whether growing or not, with a THC concentration of not more than three-tenths percent on a dry weight basis.] An agricultural product, whether growing or not, limited to

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1 types of the plant Cannabis saliva L. and any part of that plant, including the 2 seeds and all derivatives, extracts, resin extracted from any part of the plant, cannabinoids, isomers, acids, salts, and salts of isomers, with a delta-9 3 tetrahydrocannabinol concentration of no more than 0.3 percent on a dry 4 5 weight basis. INDUSTRIAL HEMP does not include any synthetically derived 6 cannabinoid. 7 (F) OFFER FOR SALE. The solicitation, advertisement, allowance, 8 inducement, or any other method or attempt to encourage any person to 9 acquire, possess, sell, purchase, or exchange a product. There is a rebuttable 10 presumption that a product is for sale if it is located with other products 11 offered for sale. 12 (G) PERSON. Any individual, partnership, firm, or corporation. 13 (H) [SEMI-SYNTHETIC CANNABINOID. A substance that is created by a 14 chemical reaction that converts one cannabinoid extracted from a cannabis 15 plant directly into a different cannabinoid. Semi-synthetic cannabinoids do not 16 include cannabinoids produced via decarboxylation of naturally occurring 17 acidic forms of cannabinoids, such as THCA, into the corresponding neutral 18 cannabinoid, such as THC, through the use of heat or light, without the use of 19 chemical reagents or catalysts, and that results in no other chemical change.] 20 (I) (H) SYNTHETIC[ALLY DERIVED] CANNABINOID. A cannabinoid-like [Bracketed/Strikethrough Material]

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29 compound that was produced by using chemical synthesis, chemical modification, or chemical conversion. (1) Synthetic cannabinoid does not include: (a) A compound produced through the decarboxylation of naturally occurring cannabinoids from their acidic forms; or (b) A semi-synthetic cannabinoid. [A substance derived from a chemical reaction that changes the molecular structure of any substance separated or extracted from the plant Cannabis sativa L.1 30 (J) (4) TETRAHYDROCANNABINOL (THC) or THC OR COMPARABLE 31 CANNABINOID. [Delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol (CAS number 1972-08-3) as 32 measured using a post-decarboxylation method and based on percentage dry

weight.] [A cannabinoid found in cannabis, including but not limited to:

- 1 a. Tetrahydrocannabinolic acid (THC-A);
- 2 b. Any tetrahydrocannabinol, including Delta-8 tetrahydrocannabinol, Delta-9-
- 3 tetrahydrocannabinol, and Delta- I 0- tetrahydrocannabinol, or similar
- 4 substances, however derived;
- 5 c. Any other cannabinoid, except cannabidiol (CBD), deemed to cause
- 6 intoxication.]
- 7 § 9-11-3-4 PROHIBITED SALES AND DISTRIBUTION.
- 8 (A) It is unlawful for any person to maintain or operate any business in
- 9 which, for the benefit of the business, hemp is chemically or synthetically
- 10 altered to have a concentration of more than 0.3 percent of
- 11 tetrahydrocannabinol.
- 12 (B) It is unlawful for a person, or business, to sell, advertise, offer to sale,
- or manufacture any synthetically derived cannabinoid product that contains
- 14 tetrahydrocannabinol or comparable cannabinoid concentrations of more than
- 15 0.3 percent.
- 16 [(C) Notwithstanding the foregoing, nothing herein shall prohibit a
- 17 manufacturer from manufacturing any bulk ingredients containing hemp,
- 18 regardless of concentration, so long as such ingredients do not contain
- 19 synthetically derived cannabinoids and such ingredients are not for consumer
- ¹ 20 use or retail distribution. For the avoidance of doubt, any finished goods
 - containing hemp and sold to consumers or available in retail distribution in
- 22 the City shall be in accordance with this ordinance.]
- 23 § 9-11-3-5 ENFORCEMENT.
 - (A) The Albuquerque Police Department, Environmental Health Department,
 - and other designated agencies shall enforce this ordinance.
 - (B) Violations of this ordinance shall constitute a petty misdemeanor
 - subject to the penalty provisions in 1-1-99.
 - (C) Businesses found in violation may have their operating licenses

- 30 § 9-11-3-6 SIGNAGE AND EDUCATION.
- 31 (A) Licensed businesses selling non-intoxicating hemp products must
- 32 display signage stating, "Sale of intoxicating hemp products is prohibited
- 33 under Albuquerque law."
