2 PROVIDING FOR THE AUTHORIZED STORAGE AND ADMINISTRATION OF 3 NALOXONE IN PUBLIC SPACES TO HELP REVERSE AN OPIOID OVERDOSE. 4 WHEREAS, the City of Albuquergue recognizes that New Mexico has the 5 second highest rate of opioid drug overdose deaths in the country; and 6 WHEREAS, the opioid addiction and overdose epidemic affects people in 7 every walk of life; and 8 WHEREAS, the City of Albuquerque and Bernalillo County has one of the 9 highest incidents of overdose deaths per capita in New Mexico; and WHEREAS, the Office of National Drug Control Policy has stated that 10

naloxone distribution is a key component of overdose prevention; and

WHEREAS, the State of New Mexico has expanded the use of naloxone, a prescription medication that can be used to reverse the effects of an opiate overdose, as part of its harm reduction program; and

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2016,Governor Susana Martinez signed House Bill 277 which received unanimous support from the New Mexico Legislature to allow for the possession, distribution and storage of an opiate overdose antidote (naloxone or Narcan®) by individuals and community organizations under a standing order and relieves individuals or registered overdose prevention and education programs from civil liability; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of this resolution is to promote public health,
safety, and welfare by making naloxone more readily available in the City while
protecting city staff and city resources from potential liability or other
consequence related to its use or non-use; and

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WHEREAS, opioid overdose death is preventable through administering
naloxone, which is a safe medication that reverses and blocks the effects of
opioids and can be used to treat a known or suspected opioid overdose; and
WHEREAS, naloxone can rapidly begin reversing the effects of an opioid
overdose while emergency care is being sought by calling 911 and/or getting a
person suffering from an overdose to emergency care; and

7 WHEREAS by expanding access to this overdose reversal drug, we are
8 doing our best to ensure that the first responders to the scene of an overdose
9 can save lives; and

WHEREAS the City of Albuquerque requests a standing order to allow for
the obtaining and storage of naloxone in public spaces for emergency use and

12 organized staff trainings from the New Mexico Department of Health.

13 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL, THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF14 ALBUQUERQUE:

15 Section 1. The following is adopted and added to the Albuquerque Code of16 Resolutions at Section 3-10-4:

17 "[3-10-3 NALOXONE AT PUBLIC FACILITIES

18 <u>A. City facilities with public access will safely store naloxone on site as part of</u>

19 an emergency first aid kit, at or near other emergency medical treatment

20 equipment or supplies (e.g. AED or first aid kits) and will post signage to

21 indicate that naloxone is available on site and its location.

22 B. City Departments overseeing those facilities cited in Paragraph A of this

23 resolution will identify City employees at each facility to be specifically trained

24 <u>in monitoring the availability of and in administering naloxone at those</u>
25 facilities.

26 <u>C. Naloxone training shall be incorporated into the city's CPR training</u>

27 program for city employees. However, city employees who undergo such

28 training, including the employees identified in paragraph 'B' above, are not

29 obligated or cloaked with any duty to administer naloxone under any

30 <u>circumstance.</u>

31 D. The Albuquerque Fire Department (AFD) will procure and store naloxone

32 rescue kits for the purpose of dispensation to City employees as identified in

33 paragraph 'B' above over a nine-month period beginning January 1, 2017 with

[Bracketed/Underscored Material] - New [Bracketed/Strikethrough Material] - Deletion 1 a completion date of October 1, 2017. Naloxone training for employees and

2 placement of the naloxone kits in identified locations shall be phased in with

- 3 the expectation that 50% of the locations identified in paragraph 'A' above,
- 4 shall have naloxone kits by April 15, 2017.
- 5 E. All social services organizations within the City of Albuquerque receiving
- 6 <u>City of Albuquerque funding to provide a public service or public assistance at</u>
- 7 their facility, are encouraged to attend a naloxone training and equip their
- 8 <u>facilities with potentially lifesaving opiate overdose antidote kits.</u>
- 9 F. Continuation of the naloxone program shall be dependent on feasibility,
- 10 and on available funding.
- 11 G. AFD will identify an existing source of funding not less than \$7,500 for the
- 12 purchase of naloxone rescue kits which will be stored in City facilities
- 13 identified in paragraph 'A', above.]"
- 14 Section 2. SEVERABILITY. If any section, paragraph, sentence, clause,
- 15 word, or phrase of this resolution is for any reason held to be invalid or
- 16 unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not
- 17 affect the validity of the remaining provisions of this resolution. The Council
- hereby declares that it would have passed this resolution and each section,
 paragraph, sentence, clause word phrase irrespective of any provisions being
- 20 declared unconstitutional or otherwise invalid.
 - Section 3. COMPILATION. The resolution set forth in Section 1 above shall amend, be incorporated in and made part of the Albuquerque Code of Resolutions.
 - Section 4. EFFECTIVE DATE. This resolution shall take effect five days after publication by title and general summary.

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
