	23	WHEREAS, opioid overdose death is preventable through administering
	24	naloxone, which is a safe medication that reverses and blocks the effects of
	25	opioids and can be used to treat a known or suspected opioid overdose; and

1	WHEREAS, naloxone can rapidly begin reversing the effects of an opioid
2	overdose while emergency care is being sought by calling 911 and/or getting a
3	person suffering from an overdose to emergency care; and
4	WHEREAS by expanding access to this overdose reversal drug, we are
5	doing our best to ensure that the first responders to the scene of an overdose
6	can save lives; and
7	WHEREAS the City of Albuquerque requests a standing order to allow for
8	the obtaining and storage of naloxone in public spaces for emergency use and
9	organized staff trainings from the New Mexico Department of Health.
0	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL, THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF
1	ALBUQUERQUE:
2	Section 1. City facilities with public access which are identified in
3	Attachment A will safely store a naloxone rescue kit on site as an emergency
4	rescue effort to be used on an individual who may be suffering or appear to be
5	suffering from an opioid overdose. It is recommended that the naloxone kit be
6	placed at or near other emergency medical treatment equipment or supplies
7	(e.g. AED or first aid kits) and that facility signage be posted to indicate that
8	naloxone kits are on site with responsible party.
9	Section 2. City Departments overseeing those facilities cited in Section 1 of
20	this resolution will identify City employees at each facility to be trained in
21	securing, monitoring the use of and administering naloxone at those facilities
22	by November 15, 2016.
23	Section 3. The Albuquerque Fire Department (AFD) will procure and store
24	naloxone rescue kits for the purpose of dispensation to City employees as
25	identified in Section 2 of this resolution by November 15, 2016.
26	Section 4. All social services organizations within the City of Albuquerque
27	receiving City of Albuquerque funding to provide a public service or public
28	assistance at their facility, are encouraged to attend a naloxone training and
29	equip their facilities with potentially lifesaving opiate overdose antidote kits.
80	Section 5. Continuation of the naloxone program shall be dependent on
1	feasibility, and on available funding
