9 (a) Dogs weighing less than 30 pounds shall have eight square feet
10 of flat floor space and two feet of vertical space per dog, unless otherwise
11 indicated by a licensed veterinarian. The guidance of a veterinarian is crucial
12 in determining the suitable housing for companion animals, considering their
13 unique health requirements and overall well-being.

14 (b) Dogs weighing between 30 and 65 pounds shall have 12 square
15 feet of flat floor space and three feet of vertical space per dog, unless
16 otherwise indicated by a licensed veterinarian. The guidance of a veterinarian
17 is crucial in determining the suitable housing for companion animals,
18 considering their unique health requirements and overall well-being.

19 (c) Dogs that weigh more than 65 pounds shall have 24 square feet
20 of flat floor space and three feet of vertical space per dog, unless otherwise
21 indicated by a licensed veterinarian. The guidance of a veterinarian is crucial
22 in determining the suitable housing for companion animals, considering their
23 unique health requirements and overall well-being.

24 SECTION 2. SEVERABILITY. If any section, paragraph, sentence, clause or
25 phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unenforceable
26 by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the
27 validity of the remaining provisions of this Ordinance. The Council hereby
28 declares that it would have passed this Ordinance and each section,
29 paragraph, sentence, clause, word or phrase thereof irrespective of any
30 provision being declared unconstitutional or otherwise invalid.

31 SECTION 3. COMPILATION. SECTION 1 of this Ordinance amends, is
32 incorporated in, and is to be compiled as part of the Revised Ordinances of
33 Albuquerque, New Mexico 1994.

1 SECTION 4. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance takes effect five days after
2 publication by title and general summary.

SUBJECT: AMENDING ROA 1994, SECTION 9-2-2-4(B) OF THE HUMANE AND ETHICAL ANIMAL RULES AND TREATMENT RELATED TO HOUSING AND RESTRAINT STANDARDS

The attached legislation revises Sections 9-2-2-4(B)(1)(a), 9-2-2-4(B)(2)(a), (b) and (c) to include the following statement: "...unless otherwise indicated by a licensed veterinarian. The guidance of a veterinarian is crucial in determining the suitable housing for companion animals, considering their unique health requirements and overall well-being."

The revision to the ordinance will enable licensed veterinarians to assess and recommend appropriate housing for companion animals, considering their health requirements and overall well-being. Without this amendment, veterinarians could be in violation of the current ordinance if, in their professional judgment, animals should be housed in kennels smaller than the current minimum space requirements.

This proposed amendment is not associated with a financial impact.





The guidance of a veterinarian is crucial in determining the suitable housing for companion animals, considering their unique health requirements and overall well-being."

3. Why is the project needed?

This project is essential to enable licensed veterinarians to assess and recommend appropriate housing for companion animals, considering their health requirements and overall well-being.

Veterinarians will not be in compliance with the City Ordinance if they determine that a companion animal kept at a Boarding Kennel, Guard Dog Site, Animal Shelter including the Albuquerque Animal Care Center (AACC), or a Pet Store should be provided lesser minimum floor space than what is mandated in the current ordinance based on the individual health requirements and overall wellbeing of a specific companion animal.
