 - Creates a sustainable economy that generates opportunities for entrepreneurs and existing businesses while providing living wages, a safe work environment, health insurance, sick leave, and retirement benefits for employees.
 - Fosters a co-existence with the natural environment to ensure a sustainable water supply, clean air, the conservation of open spaces, water courses, wildlife, and mitigation of the impacts of climate change.
 - Provides all citizens access to art, civic engagement, culture, entertainment, history and literature.
