COUNCIL BILL NO. <u>R-13-131</u> ENACTMENT NO. _ **SPONSORED BY:** Dan Lewis 1 RESOLUTION 2 ESTABLISHING A LEGISLATIVE POLICY FOR THE CITY OF ALBUQUERQUE 3 FOR THE 2013 LEGISLATIVE SESSION OF THE NEW MEXICO LEGISLATURE. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL, THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF 4 5 **ALBUQUERQUE:** 6 Section 1. That the legislative policy for the 2013 Session of the New 7 Mexico Legislature is hereby approved and adopted as follows: 8 **REVENUE MEASURES.** The City of Albuquerque: **(A)** 9 (1) urges that the New Mexico State Legislature not take any 10 action to reduce, alter or repeal the Food and Medical Hold Harmless 11 **Provision for Local Governments;** - Deletion Bracketed/Underscored Material] - New 12 (2) opposes any erosion of local government taxing authority and 13 the City's gross receipts tax base; supports the examination of alternatives to enhance the (3) revenue stream or create diversity to stabilize municipal revenue sources; and (4) opposes changes relative to local franchise fees and franchises which would have the effect of lowering municipal revenues or lessening control over municipal rights-of-way. **(B)** CAPITAL PROJECTS. The City requests: (1) that existing City capital projects be reauthorized, and new projects identified by the City as having a high priority receive capital outlay funding; 23 (2) funding for the purchase of right-of-way for the Paseo del Volcan By-Pass Freeway; and 24 25 funding for the purchase of open space. (3) 26

1 (C) ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT. The City:

2 (1) urges the State to recognize the regional importance of the
3 I-25/Paseo del Norte interchange project headed by the New Mexico
4 Department of Transportation, to continue to support the collaboration among
5 local, State and Federal agencies on the project, and to provide funding
6 toward the completion of the phased renovation of the interchange;

7 (2) supports the Mainstreet program (including Nob Hill in
8 Albuquerque) and the preservation and prioritization of local economic
9 development in State economic planning;

10 (3) supports funding for the purchase of properties in targeted
11 areas to remove blighted structures to stimulate redevelopment of the area;

12 (4) supports the continued recruitment of, and incentives for, the13 film industry;

14 (5) supports comprehensive legislation to eliminate abusive
15 predatory lending practices, including payday, car title and mortgage loans;

16 (6) supports legislative amendments to clarify provisions of the 17 Tax Increment Development District (TIDD) statute regarding notice to affected 18 state and local governmental entities, the assessment and distribution 19 process, payment of administrative expenses, calculation of base taxes and 20 tax increments, the termination process, and the board election process;

(7) supports the adoption of an optional Single Sales Factor for Manufacturers, provided that the state's existing incentives remain intact;

(8) supports Post-Performance Tax Credit, which provides that up to 30% of the new state revenues from a qualified business entity's economic base project can be refunded to the taxpayer as a credit, based on a portion of the new revenues that are generated for the State;

(9) urges the State to support Local Economic Development Act
(LEDA) funding, which serves as a closing fund in recruiting companies to the
State or supporting expansions of existing economic base companies by
providing funding to local governments for qualified job creation projects
through Capital Outlay allocation;

32 (10) urges the State to increase marketing funds for economic33 development and recruitment;

(11) supports the increase in marketing funds for State tourism;

2 (12) supports reducing the corporate income tax from 7.6% to 4.9%
3 over a four-year period to mirror the Personal Income Tax; and

4 (13) supports the proposal for an informed consent law that is 5 extended to spacecraft manufacturers and suppliers to make Spaceport 6 America more competitive with the 12 other states that have passed this type 7 of informed consent.

(D) CHILDREN, YOUTH AND SENIORS. The City encourages:

9 (1) the appropriation of funds to retain the level of financial
10 support for the 21st Century Learning Center educational programs at full
11 funding at all existing sites;

12 (2) maintaining Medicaid and SCHIP coverage at current levels of 13 coverage; and

14 (3) maintaining funding for the City's Home Services Program
15 which provides home repair, chores and retrofit for senior citizens.

(E) HOUSING AND EDUCATION. The City supports:

17 (1) legislative efforts to increase the funding for the New Mexico
18 Housing Trust Fund and provide greater regulatory flexibility to increase the
19 supply of affordable housing and its rehabilitation in Albuquerque;

(2) adequate and equitable funding for Albuquerque public schools, charter schools, institutions of higher education, and alternative schools for at-risk children;

(3) the Legislature requiring that local school districts enter into
 partnerships with local governments to achieve the most effective use of all
 public facilities by the community; and

(4) making capital funding available to charter schools.

(F) PUBLIC SAFETY. The City:

28 (1) supports strengthening laws to end motorists driving while29 impaired;

30 (2) supports continued funding for alcohol and drug treatment31 services;

(3) supports legislation that increases penalties for persons who
 act in concert to illegally obtain merchandise from retail establishments for
 the purpose of reselling items;

4 (4) supports enhanced legislation that will expand the list of
5 violent crimes that qualify for a life sentence under the current three strikes
6 law;

7 (5) supports legislation that would eliminate the statute of8 limitations for violent felonies;

9 (6) supports the work of the Domestic Violence Task Force and 10 other efforts to reduce threats to women, children and families;

(7) supports funding for the acquisition of land and/or property
for, and the operation of, a year-round emergency overnight shelter for
homeless women, children and families;

14 (8) supports legislation and potential solutions related to the15 increasing prevalence of identity theft in New Mexico;

16 (9) supports adequate funding for the Department of Corrections
17 to compensate local jails for the cost of holding parole violators and other
18 State prisoners;

(10) opposes legislative amendments that would impose a fee on
 municipalities for municipal prisoners housed in county detention facilities;

(11) supports sentencing alternatives to allow more effective localcontrol of jail populations;

(12) supports strengthening the sentences for all human trafficking
 convictions from a third-degree felony to a first-degree felony;

(13) supports the renewal of statute 61-12c-9 to require that all State massage parlors be licensed to practice in an effort to combat trafficking practices in these businesses;

(14) supports strengthening the language in statute 30-52-1 on
Human Trafficking from "...recruiting, soliciting, enticing, transporting or
obtaining by any means..." to "...recruiting, soliciting, enticing, transporting
or proceeding with intent to obtain by any means..." to eliminate a possible
loophole; and

1 (15) supports the crafting of legislation using the Treatment 2 Guardian Act statutes as a base to create a voluntary model for individuals 3 living with mental illness who are declared incompetent after being 4 adjudicated to receive treatment and supervision.

5 (G) LAND USE. The City:

6 (1) supports a legislative amendment to reinstate the City's 7 extraterritorial planning and zoning authority that would allow the City and 8 Bernalillo County to develop a mutually acceptable and cooperative decision-9 making process regarding land in the extraterritorial area.

10 (H) ANIMAL ISSUES. The City of Albuquerque supports:

11 (1) funding to assist local animal shelters with the costs of12 sheltering animals under court-ordered protective custody;

13 (2) statewide legislation for mandatory spay and neuter
14 requirements together with funding for low-income spay and neuter programs;

15 (3) legislative efforts to address issues arising from the links
16 between domestic violence, child abuse and animal abuse; and

17 (4) legislative amendments to the current State Cruelty Law to18 define neglect as cruelty and increase penalties for animal cruelty.

(I) GENERAL. The City supports the policy statements and resolutions
of the New Mexico Municipal League (NMML); if any NMML policies are
inconsistent with the provisions of this Resolution, the provisions herein shall
prevail.

(J) GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE. This Resolution will be amended, if necessary, to address any issues brought forth by the Governor's Message that are not addressed herein.
