- 9 resources and budgetary appropriations, not to exceed \$1,000,000 unless
- 10 otherwise approved by the City Council, as necessary to help address or
- 11 combat the proclaimed emergency.
- 12 (G) Enter any agreements authorizing the use of city owned property by
- 13 third parties, or agreements for the city's use of non-city owned property,
- 14 outside of the usual requirements for city real property transactions
- 15 prescribed by ROA 1994 § 5-2-1 et seq. as necessary to help address or
- 16 combat the proclaimed emergency.
- 17 (H) Issue such other orders as are imminently necessary for the
- 18 protection of life and property throughout the duration of the emergency,
- 19 including any provisions above that have not been previously invoked.may
- 20 issue such public health advisories or recommendations as deemed
- 21 appropriate in consultation with City Office of Emergency Management, and

4 § 2-9-1-5 PUBLICATION OF ORDERS[, ADVISORIES OR

RECOMMENDATIONS].

The Mayor shall immediately deliver a copy of the declaration and all orders[<u>, advisories</u>, or recommendations] issued pursuant to authority contained in § 2-9-1-3 or § 2-9-1-4 to the Albuquerque Police Department, Albuquerque Fire and Rescue, all major media outlets serving the city, and the City Councilors. The Mayor shall also post a copy of such orders[<u>, advisories</u>, <u>or recommendations</u>] to the city's website, distribute them through the city's primary social media accounts, and take such additional reasonable measures necessary to inform impacted persons and businesses of the emergency 1 declaration and associated emergency orders[, advisories, or

2 <u>recommendations</u>].

3 § 2-9-1-6 DURATION AND EXTENSION OF EMERGENCY PROCLAMATION[.
4 ORDERS, ADVISORIES, OR RECOMMENDATIONS].

5 Any emergency proclaimed in accordance with the provisions of §§ (A) 6 2-9-1-1 et seg. shall take effect immediately, and terminate after 48 hours from 7 the issuance thereof, or may terminate sooner upon the issuance of a 8 proclamation by the Mayor determining an emergency no longer exists, 9 whichever occurs first; provided, however, that any emergency proclamation 10 may be sooner terminated by resolution of the City Council prior to the 11 termination of 48 hours or may be extended by resolution of the Council as 12 originally proclaimed or with amendments for any such additional periods of 13 time as deemed necessary by the City Council up to a maximum of 90 days 14 per proclamation.

15 **(B)** Any public health emergency proclaimed in accordance with the 16 provisions of §§ 2-9-1-1 et seq. shall take effect immediately, and terminate 17 upon the date set forth by the proclamation, not to exceed 30 days from the 18 issuance thereof, or may terminate sooner upon the issuance of a 19 proclamation by the Mayor determining an emergency no longer exists, 20 whichever occurs first; provided, however, that any emergency proclamation[, 21 order, advisories, or recommendations] may be sooner terminated or 22 amended by resolution of the City Council prior to the termination of 30 days 23 or may be extended by any resolution of the Council as originally proclaimed[, 24 ordered, advised, or recommended] or with amendments for any such 25 additional periods of time as deemed necessary by the City Council up to a 26 maximum of 90 days per proclamation."

SECTION 2. SEVERABILITY. If any section, paragraph, sentence, clause,
word or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or
unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not
affect the validity of the remaining provisions of this Ordinance. The Council
hereby declares that it would have passed this Ordinance and each section,
paragraph, sentence, clause, word or phrase thereof irrespective of any
provision being declared unconstitutional or otherwise invalid.

1	SECTION 3. COMPILATION. Sections 1 of this Ordinance shall amend, be
2	incorporated in and complied as part of the Revised Ordinances of
3	Albuquerque, New Mexico, 1994.
4	SECTION 4. EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance takes effect five days after
5	publication by title and generally summary.
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
