1 RESOLUTION

2 CITY OF ALBUQUERQUE PROJECT RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE MID-
3 REGION COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS FOR INCLUSION IN THE 2040 AND
4 2045 METROPOLITAN PLAN AND FOR CONSIDERATION FOR FEDERAL
5 FUNDING IN THE PROPOSED FY 2020 TO FY 2025 TRANSPORTATION
6 IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM FOR THE ALBUQUERQUE METROPOLITAN
7 PLANNING AREA.

8 WHEREAS, for the City of Albuquerque to be eligible to receive federal
9 transportation funds as a member of the Mid-Region Council of Governments
10 (MRCOG), a project must be included in both the Metropolitan Transportation
11 Plan (MTP) and the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP); and

12 WHEREAS, the City Council passed and adopted Council Bill Number O-07-
13 89 on September 5th, 2007 establishing procedures for inclusion and
14 amendment projects in MTP and the TIP of the Albuquerque Metropolitan
15 Planning Area; and

16 WHEREAS, the procedures mandated in O-07-89 have been codified in “§2-
17 12-8 Metropolitan Transportation Plan And Transportation Improvement
18 Program Submittals”, that mandate the Mayor shall submit a proposed
19 resolution to the City Council setting forth projects recommended for
20 inclusion in the Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) and the
21 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) of the Albuquerque Metropolitan
22 Planning Area at least 30 days prior to the deadline for project submittals as
23 established by the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO). Projects shall
24 only be submitted to the MPO for inclusion in the MTP and/or the TIP by City
25 Council resolution; and

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1 WHEREAS, a combination of circumstances prevented the Administration
2 from transmitting a list to the City Council before submittal to the MRCOG.
3 These include a shorter than normal application period, and a delay in
4 receiving information on the amount of funding that was available to the
5 region due to the late arrival of additional funding resources from the Federal
6 Highway Administration; and

7 WHEREAS, there is a limited number of projects that qualify for the funding
8 made available to the TIP process. These limits are due to: 1) the Federal
9 Transportation funding categories that fund the Transportation Improvement
10 Program are formula funds with restrictions on the type of projects that can be
11 funded, based on the purpose of the project and its significance to federal
12 transportation goals, the ability of the project to obtain a federal review, and
13 the capacity of the City to design, obtain environmental clearances and
14 construct the project the fiscal year the funding is available; 2) the projects
15 must further the goals set forth in the City Comprehensive Plan; and 2) the
16 amount of funding available to the TIP has not increased at or near the level of
17 the inflation rate for transportation projects, which relegates TIP funding to
18 mostly supplementing other funding sources assigned to a project; and

19 WHEREAS, since 2016 to identify the appropriate projects that can be
20 funded with these limitations the City has established a joint staff committee
21 from the Aviation Department, the City Council Services Office, the
22 Environmental Health Department, the Department of Municipal Development,
23 the Parks and Recreation Department, the Planning Department, and the
24 Transit Department. The committee is to identify projects of importance that
25 qualify for TIP funding criteria, and achieve the City’s adopted policies
26 pertaining to, equity, land use and transportation. The Committee then choose
27 from amongst that list the projects that would most benefit from the funding
28 and are the most likely to receive funding through the MRCOG’s competitive
29 selection process; and

30 WHEREAS, the list of projects includes, funding for vision zero, electric
31 busses, developing a high capacity bus route, multi-use trails, funding for
32 transit stations and bus stops, development of regional and arterial roadways
33 and traffic signal technology updates.

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1 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL, THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF
2 ALBUQUERQUE:

3 SECTION 1. The City Council adopts the attached updated list of priority
4 projects to be included in the 2045 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) for
5 consideration of federal funding in the proposed FY 2024 to FY 2029 TIP. The
6 projects identified in Attachment 1 shall represent the official list of priority
7 projects to be included in the 2045 MTP.

8 Section 2. In addition to submittal of the priority list the City asks that the
9 member agencies of the Albuquerque Metropolitan Planning Area (AMPA)
10 encourage the New Mexico Department of Transportation (NMDOT) to include
11 in its Federal Program for NMDOT District 3 the following projects:

- 12 1) As a component of the reconstruction of Interstate 25 from Central
13 Avenue to Gibson Boulevard, to construct sound walls along this
14 corridor for the purpose of furthering the conservation of historic
15 district, and environmental justice for low income minority
16 neighborhoods.
- 17 2) Reconstructing Interstate 25 and its interchanges from Commanche/
18 Griegos Road to Montano Road/Montgomery Boulevard.
- 19 3) General purpose lane, bicycle lane, and pedestrian improvements to the
20 New Mexico State Highway 45 (Coors Boulevard) from Old Coors Road
21 to Paseo Del Norte.
- 22 4) Bike and pedestrian access and Motor Vehicle Traffic flow
23 improvements to the Interstate 40 Interchange at Rio Grande Boulevard.
- 24 5) A partnership with the City of Albuquerque to extend the Interstate-40
25 bike trail from Rio Grande Boulevard to where the Paseo Del Nor Este
26 Trail intersects the University Boulevard.
- 27 6) A partnership with the City of Albuquerque to rehabilitate the
28 recreational parkway/planting strips on New Mexico State Highway 556
29 (Tramway Road).
