	4	WHEREAS, New Mexico has been grappling with a significantly elevated			
	5	violent crime rate; and			
	6	WHEREAS, the state's prison population has consistently declined over the			
	7	past six years, with a projected 3% reduction anticipated in 2024; and			
	8	WHEREAS, it is imperative for the state to take proactive measures to			
	9	prevent crime and ensure the incarceration of dangerous criminals; and			
	0	WHEREAS, New Mexico has recorded substantial revenue surpluses in

2	4	WHEREAS, the behavioral health system in New Mexico, particularly			
2	5	substance abuse treatment, has been failing its residents, causing widespread			

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harm; and

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1	WHEREAS, drug addiction has been identified as a root cause of crime,
2	necessitating comprehensive efforts to address both property and violent
3	crime; and
4	WHEREAS, people charged with violent crimes pose a significant threat to
5	our community; and
6	WHEREAS, in August of 2021, Governor Lujan Grisham unequivocally
7	declared her support for a "rebuttable presumption" as a critical measure to
8	address the revolving door of violent crime that has plagued our state stating,
9	"I believe a rebuttable presumption for individuals accused of violent crimes
10	can be a wedge in the revolving door of repeat violent offenses that have
11	characterized the worst aspects of the crime our state continues to
12	experience"; and
13	WHEREAS, the State House and the State Senate appropriated \$10 million
14	for warrant enforcement, and
15	WHEREAS, Governor Lujan Grisham said, "If you're abusing the pretrial
16	system in New Mexico: Your time is up," in her press release announcing the
17	release of the warrant enforcement funds; and
18	WHEREAS, repeat violent offenders who use firearms in the commission of
19	their crime pose a greater threat to the public; and
20	WHEREAS, Alex Piquero, a criminologist at the University of Texas at
21	Dallas, said "A routine finding in the criminological literature is that about half
22	of the crime is committed by a very small fraction of the population."
23	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL, THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF
24	ALBUQUERQUE:
25	Section 1. The Governor should call a special legislative session, and the
26	Governor, New Mexico House, and New Mexico Senate should prioritize
27	addressing the behavioral health crisis in New Mexico and create a
28	comprehensive plan allocating the necessary resources to combat the opioid
29	and methamphetamine addiction epidemic, enhance mental health services,
30	and improve addiction treatment access throughout the state.
31	Section 2. The Governor should call a special legislative session, and the
32	Governor, New Mexico House, and New Mexico Senate should prioritize

reform of the pretrial detention system including the implementation of a

	2	rape, human trafficking, or other serious sex crimes.
	3	Section 3. The Governor should call a special legislative session, and the
	4	Governor, New Mexico House, and New Mexico Senate should prioritize
	5	continued funding of the warrant enforcement program at current levels for
	6	the next five years.
	7	Section 4. The Governor should call a special legislative session, and the
	8	Governor, New Mexico House, and New Mexico Senate should prioritize
	9	passing legislation that imposes a lifetime sentence for repeat offenders who
	10	use firearms in the commission of the violent crime after committing a third
	11	violent offence.
