2 APPROVING AND AUTHORIZING THE ACCEPTANCE OF GRANT AWARDS
3 FROM THE FEDERAL EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY (FEMA) AND
4 PROVIDING FOR AN APPROPRIATION TO THE DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE
5 AND ADMINISTRATION FOR FISCAL YEARS 2024, 2025 and 2026.

6 WHEREAS, one of the goals of the City of Albuquerque as an immigrant
7 friendly city is to improve the lives of immigrants, refugees, and asylees living
8 in and traveling through Albuquerque; and

9 WHEREAS, Article VIII of the City Charter states that, “The Council shall
10 preserve, protect and promote human rights and human dignity.... and shall
11 prohibit discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, national origin
12 or ancestry, age or physical handicap”; and

13 WHEREAS, the Albuquerque City Council re-affirmed its commitment to
14 immigrant integration and inclusion exemplified in R-00-151 by passing M-17-4
15 which states “the Council welcomes and encourages immigrants to live, work,
16 and study in Albuquerque and to participate in community affairs, and
17 recognizes immigrants for their important contributions to our culture and
18 economy”; and

19 WHEREAS, the Federal Emergency Management Agency has made
20 available to Albuquerque the shelter and services program to provide shelter,
21 food, transportation, acute medical care, personal hygiene supplies, and labor
22 to provide these services; and

23 WHEREAS, in order to meet the emergent need, the City was awarded
24 Federal Funding on September 28,2023 EMW-2023-SP-05176; and

25 WHEREAS, grant funds in the approximate amount of \$757,694 will be used
26 to assist asylees in the Albuquerque area; and

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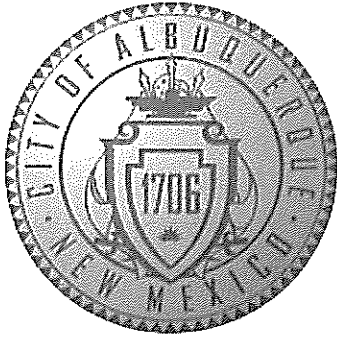
1 WHEREAS, the City of Albuquerque desires to appropriate these funds, if
2 awarded, to the Office of Emergency Management in the Finance and
3 Administration Department to achieve the grant objectives; and
4 WHEREAS, the grant funding, if awarded, would be dispersed in fiscal years
5 2024 through 2026. Grant funds do not cover City IDOH of approximately
6 \$17,000. Funds in the amount of \$17,000 will be transferred from the General
7 Fund to the Operating Grants Fund (265).BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL,
8 THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF ALBUQUERQUE:

9 Section 1. That the grant application as submitted is hereby approved, and
10 its acceptance and filing with appropriate official or office is in all respects
11 approved.

12 Section 2. That upon award, funds in the amount of \$757,694 are hereby
13 appropriated to the Office of Emergency Management in the Finance and
14 Administration Department Operating Grants Fund (265) for Fiscal Years 2024,
15 2025 and 2026. Grant funds do not cover City IDOH of approximately \$17,000.
16 Funds in the amount of \$17,000 will be transferred from the General Fund to
17 the Operating Grants Fund (265).

FEMA provided grant funding to aid the city in its efforts to assist migrants from various countries who are seeking asylum in the United States. After Title 42 was lifted there has been a surge of migrants to various boarder States & Cities. These funds will help alleviate the financial burden that this influx of migrants would have on the City. These monies will provide shelter, food transportation, acute medical care, personal hygiene supplies and case management services and to shelter migrants recently released from DHS custody.

On January 1, 2021, FEMA awarded the City of Albuquerque \$269,00 with the potential for additional funding. After a short application window, the Office of Emergency Management ("OEM") was awarded \$757,694.00. FEMA announced the initial award in early July without an application requirement. On August 21, FEMA opened the applications for additional funding with 3 weeks to submit the application. OEM applied and was awarded additional funding. Grant funds do not cover City IDOH of approximately \$17,000 which will need to be supported by general fund to the Operating Grants Fund (265).

OEM respectfully requests approval to proceed with implementing the Grant and oversee the contractual services needed to provide services to the community noncitizen migrants that the City of Albuquerque currently services as well as the anticipated groups we are anticipated to see here in the near future. We would like to expedite approvals so there is no lapse in services and we can provide assistance to this community with these awarded funds.

- 2. What will this piece of legislation do?** Help serve migrants recently released from DHS custody.
- 3. Why is this project needed?** Provide shelter, food, transportation, acute medical care, personal hygiene supplies, and case management services and to shelter noncitizen migrants recently released from DHS custody.
- 4. How much will it cost and what is the funding source?** We are projecting to utilize \$757,694.00 grant funds to include contractual services in order to provide services. Grant funds do not cover City IDOH of approximately \$17,000. Funds in the amount of \$17,000 will be transferred from the General Fund to the Operating Grants Fund (265).
- 5. Is there a revenue source associated with this contract?** If so, what level of income is projected? This will be paid by FEMA. Grant funds do not cover City IDOH which will be supported by general fund.
- 6. What will happen if the project is not approved?** Noncitizen migrants will be displaced and will not have access to mentioned services.
- 7. Is this service already provided by another entity?** Not in Albuquerque. We are working in conjunction with Non-Profit Organizations across the State and along the border.







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Article 1**Assurances, Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, Representations and Certifications**

I. L. 113-4, which prohibits recipients from discriminating in the sale, rental, financing, and advertising of dwellings, or in the provision of services in connection therewith, on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, disability, familial status, and sex (see 42 U.S.C. § 3601 et seq.), as implemented by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development at 24 C.F.R. Part 100. The prohibition on disability discrimination includes the requirement that new multifamily housing with four or more dwelling units—i.e., the public and common use areas and individual apartment units (all units in buildings with elevators and ground-floor units in buildings without elevators)—be designed and constructed with certain accessible features. (See 24 C.F.R. Part 100, Subpart D.)

Article 10 Copyright

Recipients must affix the applicable copyright notices of 17 U.S.C. §§ 401 or 402 and an acknowledgement of U.S. Government sponsorship (including the award number) to any work first produced under federal financial assistance awards.

Article 11 Debarment and Suspension

Recipients are subject to the non-procurement debarment and suspension regulations implementing Executive Orders (E.O.) 12549 and 12689, which are at 2 C.F.R. Part 180 as adopted by DHS at 2 C.F.R. Part 3002. These regulations restrict federal financial assistance awards, subawards, and contracts with certain parties that are debarred, suspended, or otherwise excluded from or ineligible for participation in federal assistance programs or activities.

Article 12 Drug-Free Workplace Regulations

Recipients must comply with drug-free workplace requirements in Subpart B (or Subpart C, if the recipient is an individual) of 2 C.F.R. Part 3001, which adopts the Government-wide implementation (2 C.F.R. Part 182) of Sec. 5152-5158 of the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988 (41 U.S.C. §§ 8101-8106).

Article 13 Duplication of Benefits

Any cost allocable to a particular federal financial assistance award provided for in 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Subpart E may not be charged to other federal financial assistance awards to overcome fund deficiencies; to avoid restrictions imposed by federal statutes, regulations, or federal financial assistance award terms and conditions; or for other reasons. However, these prohibitions would not preclude recipients from shifting costs that are allowable under two or more awards in accordance with existing federal statutes, regulations, or the federal financial assistance award terms and conditions may not be charged to other federal financial assistance awards to overcome fund deficiencies; to avoid restrictions imposed by federal statutes, regulations, or federal financial assistance award terms and conditions; or for other reasons.

Article 14 Education Amendments of 1972 (Equal Opportunity in Education Act) – Title IX

Recipients must comply with the requirements of Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, Pub. L. 92-318 (1972) (codified as amended at 20 U.S.C. § 1681 et seq.), which provide that no person in the United States will, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any educational program or activity receiving federal financial assistance. DHS implementing regulations are codified at 6 C.F.R. Part 17 and 44 C.F.R. Part 19.

Article 15 E.O. 14074 – Advancing Effective, Accountable Policing and Criminal Justice Practices to Enhance Public Trust and Public Safety

Recipient State, Tribal, local, or territorial law enforcement agencies must comply with the requirements of section 12(c) of E.O. 14074. Recipient State, Tribal, local, or territorial law enforcement agencies are also encouraged to adopt and enforce policies consistent with E.O. 14074 to support safe and effective policing.

Article 16 Energy Policy and Conservation Act

Recipients must comply with the requirements of the Energy Policy and Conservation Act, Pub. L. 94- 163 (1975) (codified as amended at 42 U.S.C. § 6201 et seq.), which contain policies relating to energy efficiency that are defined in the state energy conservation plan issued in compliance with this Act.

Article 17 False Claims Act and Program Fraud Civil Remedies

Recipients must comply with the requirements of the False Claims Act, 31 U.S.C. §§3729- 3733, which prohibit the submission of false or fraudulent claims for payment to the Federal Government. Article 18 Federal Debt Status
