Security, FY24 SSP-C Shelter and Services Program-Competitive (SSP-C) and providing an appropriation to the Office of Emergency Management in the

Department of Finance & Administration.

Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) provided grant funding to aid the city in its efforts to assist migrants from various countries who are seeking asylum in the United States. After Title 42 was lifted there has been a surge of migrants to various boarder States & Cities. These funds will help alleviate the financial burden that this influx of migrants would have on the City. These monies will provide shelter, food transportation, acute medical care, personal hygiene supplies and case management services to migrants recently released from DHS custody.

On August 28, 2024, FEMA awarded Round 2 (Reserve Funding) to the City of Albuquerque in the amount of \$533,892. Funds in the amount of \$3,699 will be transferred from the General Fund (110) to the Operating Grants Fund (265) for the purpose of meeting indirect overhead requirements.

OEM respectfully requests approval to proceed with implementing the grant and oversee the contractual services being provided to the noncitizen migrants currently being released from DHS custody. We would like to expedite approvals so there is no lapse in services and we can provide assistance to this community with these awarded funds.

Recipients must comply with drug-free workplace requirements in Subpart B (or Subpart C, if the recipient is an individual) of 2 C.F.R. Part 3001, which adopts the Government- wide implementation (2 C.F.R. Part 182) of the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988 (41 U.S.C. §§ 8101-8106).

Article 13 Duplicative Costs

Article 21 Hotel and Motel Fire Safety Act of 1990

Recipients must ensure that all conference, meeting, convention, or training space funded entirely or in part by federal award funds complies with the fire prevention and control guidelines of Section 6 of the Hotel and Motel Fire Safety Act of 1990, 15 U.S.C. § 2225a.

Article 22 John S. McCain National Defense Authorization Act of Fiscal Year 2019

Recipients, subrecipients, and their contractors and subcontractors are subject to the prohibitions described in section 889 of the John S. As such, it does not apply to tools, equipment, and supplies, such as temporary scaffolding, brought to the construction site and removed at or before the completion of the infrastructure project. Nor does a Buy America preference apply to equipment and furnishings, such as movable chairs, desks, and portable computer equipment, that are used at or within the finished infrastructure project but are not an integral part of the structure or permanently affixed to the infrastructure project. Waivers When necessary, recipients may apply for, and the agency may grant, a waiver from these requirements. The agency should notify the recipient for information on the process for requesting a waiver from these requirements. Definitions The definitions applicable to this term are set forth at 2 C.F.R. § 184.3, the full text of which is incorporated by reference.

Article 35 SAFECOM
