	22	Section 1. Two million four hundred thousand dollars (\$2,400,000) in
	23	unexpended, unencumbered fund balance is hereby reserved within the
	24	General Fund (110) to pay for salary increases and recruitment and retention
	25	programs for police officers, subject to the collective bargaining process.

Section 2. The funding reserved in Section 1 above, together with the

reserve previously made within the General Fund for the purpose of salary

increases, represents an amount equivalent to a 2.5% pay increase for members of the Albuquerque Police Officer's Association (APOA) as well as funding sufficient to reinstate the Officer Retention Plan and Student Loan Forgiveness Programs as those programs were previously agreed upon in the collective bargaining agreement between the City and the APOA effective July

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
