25	a. The February 2015 Environmental Monitoring Plan and Baseline Data

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- City Council at a regular meeting, including responses to the predominant critiques of the present plan and the visitor management analysis and monitoring plan as recommended in the Conclusions of the document; and
 - b. For any proposed project, an implementation report consistent with the Bosque Action Plan is developed in consultation with representatives of the City Council, the Parks and Recreation Department Open Space Division, Open Space Advisory Board, Middle Rio Grande Conservancy District (MRGCD), Bosque Action Team (BAT), Amigos Bravos, the ADA accessibility advocacy community, and the Greater Albuquerque Recreation and Trail Committee (GARTC). The report shall include plan details including: with respect to any trails, assessing existing trails and alternative routes, the proposed route, width, materials, and related infrastructure (such as boardwalks, bridges, viewing platforms, and signage). The report shall be made available on the City's website and presented to the public at a special advertised meeting, followed by a 30 day comment period; and
 - c. The proposed project and alternatives are transmitted to a qualified environmental consultant for review and analysis of the anticipated environmental effects of the construction and proposed operation of the project alternatives, including effects on wildlife and the health of the riparian environment. The environmental review and analysis shall recommend a preferred alternative consistent with the Bosque Action Plan. The preferred alternative shall be submitted and publicly presented to the City Council, will be made available on the City's website and presented to the public in a meeting, followed by a 30 day comment period.
 - d. No later than the time of presentation to the Council, the implementation report and the alternatives are transmitted for review and comment to the United States Army Corps of Engineers, United States Bureau of Reclamation, United States Fish and Wildlife Service, United States Environmental Protection Agency, and the
