1 RESOLUTION

2 DIRECTING THAT THE CITY PURSUE A PARTNERSHIP WITH BERNALILLO  
3 COUNTY AND POTENTIALLY OTHER LOCAL GOVERNMENTS FOR ENERGY  
4 REPRESENTATION BEFORE THE PRC IN THE CURRENT PNM RATE CASE,  
5 AND RECONSIDER ITS RELATIONSHIP WITH THE NEW MEXICO INDUSTRIAL  
6 ENERGY CONSUMERS ASSOCIATION (NMIEC).

7 WHEREAS, "NMIEC is an organization of large and industrial consumers of  
8 electricity and natural gas in the State of New Mexico"; and

9 WHEREAS, the City of Albuquerque has been a dues paying member of  
10 NMIEC since approximately 2011; and

11 WHEREAS, prior to approximately 2011, the City's representation before  
12 the Public Regulation Commission was managed and staffed directly by the  
13 City Attorney, and subsequently was entrusted to NMIEC; and

14 WHEREAS, part of NMIEC's role has been to represent the City's interests  
15 with respect to a Stipulation Agreement submitted to the Public Regulation  
16 Commission (PRC) on October 1, 2014, in docket No. 13-00390-UT (the  
17 "Stipulation Agreement") and related matters; and

18 WHEREAS, the City initially participated in the Stipulation Agreement  
19 based on representations that the Stipulation Agreement represented the least  
20 cost plan to ratepayers; and

21 WHEREAS, on April 6, 2015, the City Council adopted a resolution  
22 withdrawing its support for the Stipulation Agreement because, since the time  
23 of its filing, the costs and economics of certain elements of the Agreement  
24 had changed to the detriment of the City and its ratepayers; and

25 WHEREAS, after the City withdrew its support for the initial stipulation,  
26 which was presented to the City by NMIEC as the final and best possible

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1 outcome, a revised and amended stipulation was developed which was  
2 somewhat closer, although still not in complete alignment, with the City's  
3 goals; and

4 WHEREAS, although the City as an entity is a large-scale energy consumer  
5 on a similar scale as other members of NMIEC, the City is unique in that it has  
6 an obligation to use its resources to advance the best interests of its  
7 constituent residents and businesses who are also PNM ratepayers; and

8 WHEREAS, to the extent that the City uses its resources to promote the  
9 interests of only large and industrial consumers of energy, it could effectively  
10 be advocating against its own constituents and the citizen tax payers that  
11 largely fund municipal government; and

12 WHEREAS, even to the extent that the City has some rate classes and  
13 consumption quantities in common with other NMIEC members, the City is  
14 unique as an entity because its electric demands span multiple rate classes,  
15 and because it has unique energy needs such as powering street lights and  
16 traffic signals, and it is not an industrial consumer; and

17 WHEREAS, the current rate proposal before the PRC provides a 4.8% rate  
18 reduction for manufacturing while increasing residential rates 7.9%, small  
19 commercial 7%, and general power (the largest category of the City's own use)  
20 by 5.17%; and

21 WHEREAS, the City Council finds that, given these broader interests, it  
22 may not be adequately represented by NMIEC which focuses primarily on  
23 advancing the interests of its large-scale and industrial members, and that the  
24 City should seek partnerships with other local governments such as Bernalillo  
25 County and the City of Santa Fe that provide similar services and have similar  
26 responsibilities to those of the City.

27 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL, THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF  
28 ALBUQUERQUE:

29 Section 1. PARTNERSHIP WITH BERNALILLO COUNTY. The City shall  
30 work with Bernalillo County to execute a Memorandum of Agreement to  
31 facilitate a system for joint representation before the New Mexico Public  
32 Regulation Commission in the forthcoming rate case as appropriate. The City  
33 Legal Department is hereby directed to work with the Bernalillo County Legal

1 Department to develop a protocol for joint representation consistent with the  
2 MOA, and discussions with the County to pursue longer-term, broader  
3 coordination with other local governments. In the event that these efforts are  
4 unsuccessful, the City Legal Department shall prepare an estimate of the cost  
5 for its own representation and present it to the Council for possible funding.

6 Section 2. CITY REPRESENTATION IN THE RATE CASE. The City Legal  
7 Department shall file to act as an intervenor in the PNM rate case presently  
8 before the PRC, so as to allow the City to act independently of NMIEC in this  
9 case.

10 Section 3. SEVERABILITY. If any section, paragraph, sentence, clause,  
11 word, or phrase of this resolution is for any reason held to be invalid or  
12 unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not  
13 affect the validity of the remaining provisions of this resolution. The Council  
14 hereby declares that it would have passed this resolution and each section,  
15 paragraph, sentence, clause, word or phrase irrespective of any provisions  
16 being declared unconstitutional or otherwise invalid.
