1 [(6)][(3)] The 911 Emergency System is a basic governmental function 2 providing emergency responses through the City Police and City Fire 3 Departments. 4 [(7)][(4)] The City, through its 911 System, is the focal point for the receipt 5 of requests for emergency transport of sick and injured persons within the 6 City. 7 [(8)][(5)] The City, through its 911 System, is the focal point for the dispatch 8 of responses to requests for emergency transport of sick and injured 9 persons within the city. 10 [(9)][(6)] In order to provide satisfactory emergency transport of sick and 11 injured persons within the City, it is necessary to establish a procedure for 12 ambulance transport service under contract with the City. 13 [(10)][(7)] The provisions of this Ordinance and any regulations 14 promulgated pursuant to this Ordinance are in addition to those standards 15 and/or requirements promulgated by the state agencies as the standards 16 and/or requirements for ambulance services and prehospital providers, 17 which as minimum standards may not be sufficient for the requisite 18 standard of care in the city. 19 [(11)][(8)] The EMS system should ultimately be a regional system to 20 include the City, County, and other governmental entities located within the 21 county. 22 The purposes of §§ 9-4-4-1 et seq. are: **(B)** 23 (1) To serve the community through the promotion of clinical 24 excellence, reliable response time performance, long range stability of service, 25 and cost containment of the EMS system within the city; and

26 (2) To protect the public safety and health through prehospital emergency care and to ensure consistency of ambulance transport services within the city; and

29 (3) To establish reasonable rates for cost recovery in dispatching 30 functions, consumable medical supplies, and staff time of personnel assisting 31 the contractor(s) in the performance of transport duties through contractual 32 agreements with the City.

33 § 9-4-4-3 DEFINITIONS.

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For the purpose of §§ 9-4-4-1 et seq., the following definitions shall apply
 unless the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning. The word
 SHALL is always mandatory and not merely directory.

911 EMERGENCY SYSTEM. A publicly supported and funded system for
delivering [EMS] [emergency medical services], public fire protection, and law
enforcement.

ADVANCED LIFE SUPPORT (ALS). Advanced prehospital and interfacility
care and treatment including basic and intermediate life support, as
prescribed by state regulation, which may be performed only by a person
licensed as a Paramedic by the Primary Care and Emergency Medical Services
Bureau of the Public Health Systems Division of the New Mexico Department
of Health and operating under medical direction.

AMBULANCE. Any vehicle, including motor vehicles, watercraft, and
 aircraft, assigned, used, or intended to be used to transport sick or injured
 persons, and operated by an ambulance service certificated as such by the
 New Mexico [Public Regulation] [State Corporation] Commission.

17 AMBULANCE TRANSPORT PROVIDER. Any appropriately certified and
18 contracted person providing emergency transport of sick or injured persons
19 by ambulance within the city.

[AUTHORITY. The EMS Authority as established by §§ <u>9-4-4-1</u> et seq.] BASIC LIFE SUPPORT (BLS). Prehospital and interfacility care and treatment, as prescribed by state regulation, which can be performed by all appropriately licensed Emergency Medical Technicians, as provided by state law.

BOARD. The Medical Control Board.

BUREAU. The Emergency Medical Services Bureau of the Community Health Systems Division of the New Mexico Department of Health.

CHIEF. The Chief of the Albuquerque Fire Department.

CITY. The City of Albuquerque as a governmental entity.

- 30 *city.* The City of Albuquerque as geographically defined.
- 31 *COMMISSION.* The County Commission of Bernalillo County, New Mexico.

1 **CONTRACTOR.** A provider [or providers] of emergency ambulance

transport services who is appropriately certified and bound by contractual
agreement to the City to engage in ambulance services.

4 *COUNCIL.* The governing body of the City of Albuquerque.

5 *DRIVER.* An individual who is qualified as an ambulance or rescue vehicle6 driver.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL DISPATCHER. A person who is trained and
certified, pursuant to state law, to receive calls for emergency medical
assistance, pro-vide dispatch life support (DLS), pre-arrival medical
instructions, dispatch emergency medical assistance, and coordinate its
response.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES (EMS). The services rendered by
 licensed Emergency Medical Technicians, certified Emergency Medical
 Services First Responders or Emergency Medical Dispatchers in response to
 an individual's need for immediate medical care in order to prevent loss of life
 or aggravation of physical or psychological illness or injury.

17 EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES SYSTEM (EMS SYSTEM). A
18 coordinated system of health care delivery that includes centralized access
19 and emergency medical dispatch, trained first responders, medical-rescue
20 services, ambulance services, hospital emergency departments, and specialty
21 care hospitals that respond to the needs of the acutely sick and injured.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL TECHNICIAN (EMT). A health care provider, licensed as such by the Emergency Medical Services Bureau of the Community Health Systems Division of the New Mexico Department of Health.

MAYOR. The Chief Executive of the City of Albuquerque.

MEDICAL CONTROL. Supervision provided by or under the direction of physicians to providers by written protocol or direct communications.

MEDICAL DIRECTION. Guidance or supervision provided by a physician,
licensed to practice in New Mexico and Board certified in emergency medicine
with current experience in the practice of emergency medicine, including
authority over and responsibility for emergency medical dispatch, direct
patient care and transport of patients, arrangements for medical control, and
all other aspects of patient care delivered by a provider.

1 MEDICAL DIRECTOR, [EXECUTIVE]. A physician, licensed to practice in 2 New Mexico and Board certified in emergency medicine with current experience in the practice of emergency medicine, who is responsible for all 3 4 medical aspects of an EMS system dealing with the provision of patient care 5 [as defined in the New Mexico Department of Health Regulations Governing] 6 **Emergency Medical Services Medical Direction**]. This includes the extension 7 of his or her license to prehospital providers; the development, 8 implementation, and evaluation of all medical aspects of an EMS system; and 9 other functions specified in §§ 9-4-4-1 et seq. [The Executive Medical Director 10 shall be eligible for staff privileges at all local hospitals and a faculty 11 appointment at the University of New Mexico School of Medicine. 12 **MEDICAL DIRECTOR. OPERATOR.** A physician, licensed to practice in 13 New Mexico and Board certified in emergency medicine with current 14 experience in the practice of emergency medicine, who is responsible for all 15 medical aspects of an EMS operator dealing with the provision of patient care 16 as defined in the New Mexico Department of Health Regulations Governing 17 **Emergency Medical Services Medical Direction.** 18 OPERATOR. Any person, firm, corporation, or public agency who is the 19 owner or proprietor of EMS response vehicles. 20 **PATIENT.** An individual who is sick, injured, wounded, or otherwise 21 incapacitated. 22 **PREHOSPITAL PROVIDER.** Any person who has the duty of caring for a

Sick, ill, or injured person, who is certified at the EMT-Basic level or higher and who is licensed by the State of New Mexico.

PROTOCOL. A predetermined, written medical care plan including standing orders.

RESCUE SERVICE. Any ALS and BLS service, municipal, county, or
private, excluding law enforcement agencies that are not otherwise providing
rescue, that is subject to being dispatched to the scene of an injury or illness
to provide rescue and immediate emergency medical care.

31 SUBSTANTIAL FINANCIAL INTEREST. That at the present or in any year
32 within the past two years, a person derived more than \$1,000 per year income

1 from employment by, or business dealings with, one or more EMS operators

2 within Bernalillo County or a contracting organization of such provider.

3 § 9-4-4-4 STATE REGULATION.

4 (A) It is recognized that certain state agencies, such as the [New Mexico
5 <u>Public Regulation</u>] [State Corporation] Commission and the State EMS Bureau,
6 regulate certain ambulance services and prehospital providers in the
7 community.

8 (B) It is also recognized that certificates, permits, and/or licenses issued
9 by those state agencies can be suspended and/or revoked only by those state
10 agencies.

(C) It is also recognized that the establishment of rates for ambulance
 services, certificated by the [<u>New Mexico Public Regulation</u>] [State
 Corporation] Commission, is solely within the purview of the [<u>New Mexico</u>]

14 <u>Public Regulation</u>] [State Corporation] Commission.

(D) It is also recognized that the State EMS Bureau regulates EMS
Medical Direction for prehospital providers in the community.

17 (E) It is intended that any regulations promulgated pursuant to §§ 9-4-4-1
18 et seq. are in addition to those standards promulgated by the state agencies
19 as the standards for ambulance services and prehospital providers. The
20 standards promulgated by the state agencies are minimum standards which
21 may not be sufficient for the requisite standard of care in the city.

(F) It is intended that the city may enter into joint powers agreements and other arrangements with governmental entities as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of §§ 9-4-4-1 et seq.

EMS AUTHORITY.

There is established a City of Albuquerque EMS Authority.

(A) Membership, Appointment, Terms, Disclosure, and *Replacement.* The Authority shall consist of five at-large community
members. One or more of the at-large community members shall have
expertise in business finance, budgeting, and accounting. The members shall
be appointed by the Mayor with the advice and consent of the Council. The
Authority shall be established in an expeditious manner. No member of the
Authority shall have a past or present substantial financial interest, as defined

1 in §§ 9-4-4-1 et seq., in any EMS system within the city or their contracting 2 organizations. The members of the Authority shall publicly disclose in writing 3 with the office of the City Clerk any substantial, past or present, financial 4 interest in any EMS system or their contracting organizations within the 5 city. The Authority shall elect its chairperson from among its members who 6 shall serve at the pleasure of the Authority. The Authority shall be convened 7 at the call of the Chairperson but shall meet not less than every two 8 months. The Authority shall operate according to the provisions of the city's 9 public boards, commissions, and committee regulations set forth in §§ 2-6-1-1 10 et seq. The terms of appointment of the initial members of the Authority shall 11 be one year for two members, two years for two members, and three years for 12 one member. Thereafter, the terms of appointment of these members shall be 13 for three years. Replacement of members shall be performed in the same 14 manner as for the initial members, provided, however, that if the County enters 15 into a joint powers agreement as defined in §§ 9-4-4-1 et seg., the Authority 16 shall be increased by two members who shall be appointed by the County 17 Commission.

(B) Authority. At a minimum, the Authority shall prepare and recommend to the Mayor requirements as specified in §§ 9-4-4-1 et seq. concerning the delivery of EMS which are consistent with applicable state and federal laws. The Authority may recommend more stringent requirements as specified in §§ 9-4-4-1 et seg. concerning EMS when deemed appropriate. The Authority is charged with, and shall be responsible for, the oversight of these requirements within the scope of the powers of the Authority and the Executive Medical Director. The Authority shall consider the recommendation from the Board on issues related to patient care and the delivery of medical service. However, the Authority is responsible for the oversight of the EMS system. Ambulances, acting under regulation of the State Corporation Commission, shall respond within the 911 Emergency System as required by 30 the City as stipulated in specific contractual agreements. In addition, all 31 operators shall provide to the authority performance reports and statistics. 32 (C) Functions.

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1 General Administration. The Authority shall be responsible for the 1) 2 administration of §§ 9-4-4-1 et seq., shall guarantee medical control of the EMS 3 system through the direction of the Board, shall directly discharge all other 4 responsibilities concerning the nonmedical aspects of the EMS system, and 5 shall recommend to the Chief and the Mayor the promulgation of rules and 6 regulations governing EMS functions pursuant to its proper administration. 7 Medical Control Board. The Board shall be responsible to the 2) 8 Authority for medical control functions as specified in § 9-4-4-8. 9 Oversight and Enhancements. The Authority shall provide general 3)__ 10 oversight with regard to the operations of the EMS system and shall be 11 responsible for the investigation and improvement, if appropriate, of existing 12 EMS programs with regard to the items below. In matters related to patient 13 care and the delivery of medical services, especially as specified in § 9-4-4-8, 14 the Authority is expected to take direction from the Board. 15 (a) Assuring the on-line and off-line medical control exercised by 16 physicians over ambulance and emergency medical services; 17 (b) Enhancing the communications and dispatch systems of the [Bracketed/Strikethrough Material] - Deletion 6 8 2 5 5 7 5 7 6 1 6 8 8 6 8 2 9 5 7 7 8 8 8 6 8 1 9 6 8 EMS program; (c) Developing, publishing, disseminating, and insuring compliance with written medical protocols (which are the responsibility of the Executive Medical Director) to serve as the required standard of care; (d) Establishing objectively stated and measurable performance standards related directly or indirectly to clinical performance and patient care; Developing an emergency medical services prevention (e) program; Conducting research concerning, and evaluating the provision (f) of, EMS services. This activity shall involve developing and implementing a unified, medical records system for EMS services; 30 (g) Engaging in such other actions which would result in needed 31 improvements to the operation and efficiency of the EMS system.

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(4) EMS Authority Report. The Authority shall prepare and submit an
 annual report concerning its activities, finances, and the performance of the
 EMS system to the Council and the Mayor.

4 (5) System Restructuring. The Authority, with the assistance of the 5 Board and the Providers Advisory Committee, shall describe the present 6 operation of the EMS system and propose a plan to fulfill the purposes of §§ 9-7 4-4-1 et seq. The City Fire Department shall continue to provide EMS services 8 to include first response, ALS, and BLS services as appropriate by medical 9 priority dispatch within the EMS system in any proposed system 10 restructuring. If a reform plan significantly changes the mission, roles, 11 responsibilities, or staffing of city prehospital EMS providers, the Authority 12 shall make recommendations to the Mayor so he may request approval from 13 the Council of the reform plan. Should the activities of the Authority materially 14 affect any existing EMS and ambulance service provider, the Authority shall 15 insure that a transition planning process takes place. 16 MEDICAL DIRECTOR; OPERATOR. 17 (A) Operators shall maintain medical direction pursuant to the

regulations of the Primary Care and EMS Bureau of the New Mexico
Department of Health, or as otherwise provided by state law. The function of
an Operator's Medical Director shall include but is not limited to the following:

(1) Establishing and managing the office of the Medical Director and the day-to-day operations of the EMS Service, in matters of medical performance.

(2) Overseeing and coordinating the activities of the EMS Operator in medical performance.

(3) Acting in close cooperation with other operator's Medical Directors to establish written protocols as required by state regulation.

(4) Acting in cooperation with the Executive Medical Director.

(5) Auditing and overseeing medical issues as they pertain to training,
 quality improvement, and service delivery.

30 (6) Acting to restrict all or part of an individual's patient care activities in
 31 accordance with existing state regulations.]

32 § [9-4-4-7] [9-4-4-5] MEDICAL DIRECTOR [of the AHJ][; EXECUTIVE]

1 [(B) The Executive Medical Director shall be a full-time position. During 2 periods when the Executive Medical Director position is vacant, the 3 Authority will request Operator Medical Directors to act in the capacity of 4 the permanent Executive Medical Director on a rotating basis for a period 5 of no less than six months. The Executive Medical Director of the AHJ shall 6 be an independent contractor and shall comply , however, with the City 7 purchasing ordinance. The Executive Medical Director position and all 8 related expenses shall be paid by the governmental and private entities 9 who come under this ordinance on a pro rata basis as determined by the 10 number of emergency medical technicians utilized by the respective entity. 11 § [9-4-4-8] [9-4-4-6] MEDICAL CONTROL BOARD.

12 (A) Membership and Terms. The members shall consist of licensed 13 physicians engaged in the practice of emergency medicine. The membership 14 of the Board shall consist of [one] [the] emergency department [physician] [medical director] or his designee from each hospital organization operating a 15 16 full service, 24-hour emergency department in the city. [The Executive 17 Medical Director shall serve as a member and chairperson of the Board.] The 18 Board shall meet no less than once every two months as determined by its 19 membership. Members [other than the Medical Director of the AHJ] shall have 20 staggered terms, and the term of appointment shall be for two years[, and 21 there shall be no limit on consecutive terms. The Medical Director of the AHJ 22 shall serve as a member and chairperson of the Board without term of 23 appointment.]

(B) *Functions.* The Board shall be responsible [to the Authority] for all aspects of medical control related to patient care and the delivery of medical services. The Board shall meet at the call of its Chairperson. The Board shall address the following matters but not be limited to these topics:

(1) Medical control over the delivery of EMS and ambulance services
including the medical control communication system.

(2) The effectiveness of the EMS dispatch communication system.

31 (3) Medical protocols (which are the responsibility of [the Executive
32 Medical Director][all Board members)] to serve as the required standard of
33 care as required by state regulation.

- 1 [(4) Measurable performance standards related directly or indirectly to 2 clinical performance and patient care.
- (5) Research and evaluation of the provision of EMS services, including 3 4 the establishment of a unified medical records system for the EMS system.
- 5 6) An emergency medical services prevention program.
- 6 (C) Medical Audits. The Board shall perform medical audits with regard 7 to the provision of EMS when requested by the Medical Director [of the AHJ.] [$\frac{1}{7}$ 8 by any doctor involved in the case, by the Authority, or when in the Board's 9 discretion it is determined that a specific incident merits investigation. The 10 Board shall establish procedures for taking complaints and acting in an 11 expeditious manner upon them. The Authority shall determine whether a 12 regular program of conducting medical audits as a service monitoring procedure is warranted.] 13

14 § [9-4-4-9] [9-4-4-7] PROVIDERS ADVISORY COMMITTEE.

15 The Mayor shall appoint a Providers Advisory Committee. The Mayor shall 16 appoint one representative to the Committee from each EMS operator within 17 the city and two representatives of all Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) 18 employed by or providing services for these service providers. [The Mayor] 19 [He] shall appoint one EMT employed by the City Fire Department and one 20 EMT employed by providers of ambulance services. The Providers Advisory 21 Committee shall assist [the Authority and] the Board in the performance of 22 their duties through advice and consultation. The Committee shall meet at the 23 call of its chairperson upon the request of the Board. Initial members shall 24 have staggered terms and, thereafter, the term of appointment shall be for two 25 years[, and there shall be no limit on consecutive terms]. [If the County enters 26 into a joint powers agreement pursuant to § 9-4-4-4(F),]The Committee shall 27 [include] [be increased by] two members who shall be appointed by the 28 County Commission. The Providers Advisory Committee shall elect its 29 chairperson from among its members.

30 § [9-4-4-10] [9-4-4-8] 911 SYSTEM.

The 911 System shall be the focal point for:

32 (A) Receipt of all requests for assistance for and emergency transport of 33 sick and injured persons.

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(B) Dispatch of all responses to requests for assistance and emergency
 transport of sick and injured persons.

3 § [9-4-4-11] [9-4-4-9] PROCEDURES FOR BEING INCLUDED IN THE 911
4 SYSTEM.

5 (A) The Mayor shall enter into [a] [at least one] contractual agreement 6 with an operator to provide emergency transport ambulance services in the 7 city pursuant to the 911 system. The application and request for proposal for 8 such contract[s] shall be subject to the City purchasing regulations.

9 [(B) The Board shall review all applications and make recommendations
10 to the Mayor.]

11 [(C)][(B)] There shall be [at least] one contract awarded to provide

12 emergency transport ambulance services[.] [, provided, however, that if the

13 county enters into a joint powers agreement pursuant to § 9-4-4-4, there

14 may be more than one contract.]

15 § [9-4-4-12] [9-4-4-10] PROCEDURES FOR RESPONSES TO REQUESTS FOR
16 EMERGENCY TRANSPORT.

(A) The City through coordinated dispatch shall:

8 (1) Receive, evaluate, and categorize all requests for emergency
9 transport of sick and injured persons within the community.

(2) Dispatch appropriate Fire Department response.

(3) Notify ambulance operator as to location and nature of call pursuant
to written protocols prepared by the Medical Control Board.

(4) Take control of patient and scene and provide for patient care until [care is transferred to a] contracted [emergency transport ambulance service] [transportation is available].

(5) Continue patient care during transport when appropriate or upon the request of a contractor.

(6) Transport patients when medically necessary [or when a contracted
 ambulance service is either delayed or unavailable] [when so determined by
 on-line medical control or previously written protocol].

(B) The ambulance transport provider[s] shall respond to any request for
emergency transport of sick or injured persons which has been referred to the
ambulance provider by the City, pursuant to contract with the City.

1 [§9-4-4-13] AMBULANCE SERVICE PROVIDERS WHO ARE CERTIFICATED TO

2 PROVIDE EXCLUSIVELY NONEMERGENCY TRANSPORTATION.

Because the services provided by holders of exclusively nonemergency
ambulance certificates may be varied and include operations which do not
require the participation of EMTs, the Authority shall regulate these providers
in a distinct and appropriate manner which is not burdensome to them. The
Authority shall regulate these services only with regard to the provision of
ambulance services which require the assistance of an EMT.]
§ [9-4-4-14] [9-4-4-11] JUDICIAL REVIEW.

All actions for judicial review must be filed within 30 days of receipt of
notice of the determination in the Second Judicial District Court in Bernalillo
County. All determinations made by the Mayor shall be sustained unless
arbitrary, capricious, contrary to law, clearly erroneous, or not based upon
substantial evidence.

15 § 9-4-4-99 PENALTY.

Any person who violates § 9-4-4-5(C)(5) shall be deemed guilty of a petty misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be subject to the penalty provisions set forth in § 1-1-99 of this code of ordinances. Every violation shall be a separate misdemeanor. Each day such violation is committed or permitted to continue shall constitute a separate offense and shall be punishable as such hereunder. ('74 Code, § 6-28-13) (Ord. 9-1993)
