23	SECTION 2. INTERIM PROCEDURE. No new recognized or non-recognized	zed
24	neighborhood associations (hereinafter both referred to as associations) sh	nall
25	be established in the City unless in compliance with the following interim	

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guidelines:

- 1. Proposed new associations shall not overlap with existing associations:
- 2. Should a proposed new association contain an area that overlaps with the boundaries of an association that has been designated inactive by the Office of Neighborhood Coordination within the twelve (12) month period prior to the application of the proposed new association, the inactive association shall have a period of sixty (60) days to reestablish their previous status. If the previously active association is successful in reinstating their active status, the new association's boundaries will not be allowed to include the area within the previously active association;
- 3. The proposed new association must adopt by-laws that, in their entirety, ensure an inclusive, democratic and representative association, including provisions that make the right to full membership, meeting attendance, voting and serving on the board available to all persons residing, owning property or owning a business within the boundaries of the proposed association.

SECTION 3. SUNSET. This resolution expires upon the sooner of the next enactment to amend the NARO in relation to the establishment of neighborhood associations or January 1, 2019.

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
