The City of Albuquerque (D) 2 supports: full funding at all existing sites for the 21st Century Learning 3 (1) 4 **Center Educational Programs**; 5 **(2)** protecting Medicaid and State Children's Health Insurance 6 Program (SCHIP) coverage; and 7 (3) protecting funding for programs for low income seniors that 8 provide home repairs and retrofits, and assist with household chores. 9 HOUSING AND EDUCATION. The City of Albuquerque supports: 10 protecting funding for the New Mexico Housing Trust Fund; (1) 11 (2) adequate and equitable funding for Albuquerque public 12 schools, charter schools, institutions of higher education, and alternative schools for at-risk children; 13 14 (3) providing capital funding to charter schools; and requiring local school districts to enter into partnerships with 15 (4) 16 local governments to achieve the most effective use of all public facilities by 17 the community. 18 (F) **PUBLIC SAFETY.** The City of Albuquerque supports: 19 a reoccurring funding source to provide for the processing (1) 20 and archiving of sexual assault evidence kits and related court expenses at 21 the State Department of Public Safety Crime Lab and qualified local agency 22 crime laboratories; 23 (2) funding for alcohol and drug treatment services; 24 expanding the list of violent crimes that qualify for a life (3) 25 sentence under the current three strikes law: 26 eliminating the statute of limitations for violent felonies; (4) **27** (5) strengthening penalties and expanding the scope of identity
 - (6) compensating local jails for the cost of holding parole violators and other State prisoners;
 - (7) prohibiting the imposition of a fee on municipalities for municipal prisoners housed in county detention facilities;
