The U.S. Department of Homeland Security has awarded Albuquerque Fire Rescue (AFR) a 2018 Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) Grant. The SAFER grant program distributes funds to eligible entities for the purpose of increasing the number of firefighters to help communities meet industry minimum standards.

AFR was awarded funds in the amount \$1,209,700 over a period of four years beginning in FY/20 through FY/24. This grant requires a cash match of \$3,376,606 and City IDOH of \$130,060.

Cover Analysis

1. What is it?

A resolution approving a grant award from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security for the 2018 Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) Grant.

This legislation will provide an appropriation to AFR upon award of the grant for a total of \$4,716,366.

I was on leave on Friday, so thank you for understanding.

If training will not start until January 2020, we cannot start the POP before then. SAFER funds will only pay for Salary and Benefits of firefighters in mandatory training (as defined by the Authority Having Jurisdiction (AHJ) or for assignment of more than 50% to a fire suppression apparatus (contributing to NFPA compliance). In short, the grant will not pay for firefighters not actively engaged in training or fire suppression.

The Non-Federal does not match to the City Match & IDOH amount on the FIA because I calculated the amounts for the FIA based on what is actually AFR's cost based on our hiring process (1st year 18 weeks as FF 3/C, 34 weeks as FF 2/C, 2nd year 18 weeks as FF 2/C, 34 weeks as FF 1/C, 3rd year 52 weeks as FF 1/C). The granting agency does not account for our hiring process and only funds each position based on the first year funding (18 weeks as FF 3/C and 34 weeks as FF 2/C). Therefore, the FIA shows the true costs of hiring the 12 positions. Yes, it is a total of 12 positions. The FIA does include in the estimated costs a potential 3% COLA increase per year if that were to be approved by a CBA in those fiscal years. I did not calculate the Holiday OT into this and thank you for catching that.

We have talked to the granting agency and we will have to submit an amendment to change the period of performance to start January 2020 and not March 11, 2020. They already said that would be approved and we can submit the amendment in December. Therefore the grant positions are going to start with the January 2020 cadet class.
