COUNCIL BILL NO. F/S R-20-121 **ENACTMENT NO.** SPONSORED BY: Klarissa J. Peña 1 RESOLUTION 2 REQUESTING THE NEW MEXICO DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION AND 3 THE NEW MEXICO STATE LEGISLATURE, TO ESTABLISH AS A PRIORITY THE DEVELOPMENT OF NEW MEXICO STATE HIGHWAY 45, (COORS 4 **BOULEVARD) BETWEEN CENTRAL AVENUE AND GUN CLUB ROAD TO** 5 URBAN ARTERIAL STANDARDS. REQUIRING THE CITY OF ALBUQUERQUE 6 TO WORK WITH THE NEW MEXICO DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION TO 7 IMPROVE THE SECTIONS OF NEW MEXICO 45 SOUTH OF CENTRAL AVENUE 8 9 WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS AND ENCOURAGING THE COUNTY OF BERNALILLO 10 TO WORK WITH THE NEW MEXICO DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION TO 11 IMPROVE THE SECTION OF COORS BOULEVARD BETWEEN OLD COORS 12 DRIVE AND GUN CLUB ROAD. 13 WHEREAS, Coors Boulevard south of Central Avenue to Interstate 25 is the primary roadway corridor that serves the 140,000 people who reside on Albuquerque's Southwest Mesa, and in Bernalillo County's South Valley; and WHEREAS, the segment of Coors between Central Avenue and Gun Club Road is a critical roadway link between the Southwest Mesa and the South Valley and Interstate 40, the Northwest Mesa, the City of Rio Rancho, the Village of Corrales and the Alameda Boulevard, Montano Road, and Paseo Del Norte, River Crossings; and WHEREAS, in 2019 this segment of Coors was travelled by up to 30,000 vehicles a day, and in 2018 the Univsersity of New Mexico Geospatial and 23 Population Studies Division identified over 600 reported crashes along this 24 segment of Coors; and 25 WHEREAS, this segment has a rural cross-section, devoid of street lighting

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for vehicle and pedestrian safety, curb and gutter for stormwater management,

1	and bike lanes, trails and sidewalks for providing bicyclists and pedestrians
2	access along the corridor; and
3	WHEREAS, this segment of Coors is owned and operated by the New
4	Mexico Department of Transportation, and provides transportation access for
5	the residents of Albuquerque and also services the South Valley of Bernalillo
6	County. Designing, funding, and constructing improvements to this corridor
7	will require a joint effort between the New Mexico Department of
8	Transportation, the City of Albuquerque, the County of Bernalillo and the Mid-
9	Region Council of Governments.
10	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL, THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF
11	ALBUQUERQUE:
12	SECTION 1. The City of Albuquerque urges the New Mexico Department of
13	Transportation and the New Mexico State Legislature to designate funding and
14	resources to upgrading to urban arterial standards New Mexico State Highway
15	45 (Coors Boulevard) from Central Avenue to Gun Club Road.
16	SECTION 2. The City of Albuquerque declares as a City priority the
17	upgrading, to urban arterial standards, of New Mexico State Highway 45
18	(Coors Boulevard) within the City's Municipal boundaries that being between
19	Central Avenue and Old Coors Drive. The Department of Municipal
20	Development is directed to work with the New Mexico Department of
21	Transportation to forge an agreement that identifies a process to fund, design
22	and construct an urban arterial cross-section on this segment of Coors
23	Boulevard.
24	SECTION 3. The City of Albuquerque encourages the County of Bernalillo
25	to forge an agreement with the New Mexico Department of Transportation to
26	upgrade the segment of New Mexico Highway 45 (Coors Boulevard) between
27	Old Coors Drive and Gun Club Road, to urban arterial standards.
28	SECTION 4. The New Mexico Department of Transportation, the City of
29	Albuquerque, and the County of Bernalillo are encouraged to apply for Federal
30	Transportation Funding through the Albuquerque Metropolitan Planning Area
31	Transportation Improvement Program for those elements of the roadway
32	improvements that will occur within the existing right of way.
