Borrego 1 **MEMORIAL** 2 URGING STATE LEGISLATORS TO ADOPT POLICIES AND STRATEGIES TO ADDRESS CLIMATE CHANGE AT UPCOMING NEW MEXICO STATE 3 4 LEGISLATIVE SESSIONS. 5 WHEREAS, legislative efforts to address climate change are taking place at 6 all levels of government, including the local, state, national, and international 7 scale; and 8 WHEREAS, adopting legislation to address climate change at the local and 9 state levels also has significant economic and social benefits, including but not 10 limited to growing the clean energy economy, creating new jobs, improving 11 public health, and building more resilient communities; and - Deletion 12 WHEREAS, the City of Albuquerque has enacted a wide variety of 13 legislation and implemented numerous strategies to address climate change **Bracketed/Strikethrough Material**] 14 in both the private and public sectors since the creation of Albuquerque's 15 Climate Action Task Force in 2008; and 16 WHEREAS, the City of Albuquerque recognizes that climate change 17 compounds existing inequities, and that cities and states around the country 18 that have been the most impacted by climate change are those best able to 19 develop solutions; and 20 WHEREAS, in 2009 the City of Albuquerque produced a Climate Action 21 Plan (CAP) that included input from citizens of the community and addressed 22 carbon offset strategies, carbon neutral buildings, livable neighborhoods, 23 renewable energy, local agriculture, zero waste, and transportation; and WHEREAS, in 2019 the City of Albuquerque enacted a Resolution 24 25 endorsing the declaration of a Climate Emergency and revisited the Climate 26 Action Plan that was originally produced in 2009; and

1	WHEREAS, since 2019 the Climate Action Plan Task Force has been
2	meeting regularly to provide input on strategies for implementation of the
3	CAP, some of which could be implemented at the state level; and
4	WHEREAS, one way that New Mexico has already started taking action to
5	address climate change was becoming a member of the United States Climate
6	Alliance, a bipartisan coalition of 25 governors committed to reducing
7	greenhouse gas emissions consistent with the goals of the Paris Agreement;
8	and
9	WHEREAS, in 2019 Governor Michelle Lujan Grisham signed a climate
10	executive order that established New Mexico as a member of the United States
11	Climate Alliance and set a statewide greenhouse gas (GHG) reduction target o
12	45% below 2005 levels by 2030; and
13	WHEREAS, other southwest states like California, Colorado, and Nevada
14	are also members of the United States Climate Alliance that have been
15	enacting policy to address climate change on both a short-term and long-term
16	basis; and
17	WHEREAS, states like California are now demonstrating impressive
18	outcomes from the implementation of their climate policies; and
19	WHEREAS, according to the United State Climate Alliance 2019 Fact Sheet,
20	since 2014 California climate investments have preserved or restored over
21	500,000 acres of land, contracted for over 3,200 units of affordable housing,
22	sprouted 50,000 urban trees, and installed 110,000 efficiency measures in
23	homes statewide; and
24	WHEREAS, states are showing the nation and the world that ambitious
25	climate action is achievable and that despite the United State federal
26	government's decision to withdraw from the Paris Agreement, states are
27	committed to supporting the international agreement, and are pursuing
28	aggressive climate action to make progress toward its goals; and
29	WHEREAS, it is both the responsibility and the opportunity of state
30	legislators to revisit legislation at legislative sessions with the aim of
31	strengthening policies and strategies that address climate change on a
