5	WHEREAS, in 2016 the New Mexico Legislature voted 91% in favor of a NM
6	State Constitutional Amendment to give judges new authority to deny release
7	to proven dangerous defendants – no matter how much they can pay for a bail
8	bond – and ensuring that defendants who are neither a danger nor a flight risk
9	may not be kept in jail before trial only because they cannot afford to buy a
10	money bond; and

23	WHEREAS, in 2015 Albuquerque Police Officer Daniel Webster was shot
24	and died several days later when detaining a convicted felon in a routine
25	traffic stop who had been in and out of the prison system: and

1	WHEREAS, in 2015 Rio Rancho Police Department Officer Gregg "Nigel"
2	Benner was killed on a routine stop by a person with a lengthy criminal record
3	and an active warrant; and
4	WHEREAS, in response to the killing, New Mexico's Attorney General
5	compiled a report that lays a "holistic" approach to address how systemic
6	gaps in intervention and prevention led Benner's killer to be out of jail; and
7	WHEREAS, to address the past problems of catch-and-release bail bond,
8	as of July 2017 new provisions in NM State Rule 403 now provide all judges
9	the explicit authority to amend conditions or to revoke pretrial release entirely
10	for defendants who commit new crimes while released; and
11	WHEREAS, New Mexico State Constitution and rule changes are modeled
12	after provisions of law in other states, the federal courts, and the District of
13	Columbia, determined to better protect public safety while ensuring taxpayer-
14	supported jail space is not used for jailing low risk defendants who do not
15	pose a danger or a flight risk; and
16	WHEREAS, the 2016 NM Constitutional Amendment and the July 2017 new
17	provisions in Rule 403 enforcing the constitution's requirements are written to
18	better deal with pre-existing real crime problems in New Mexico. They did not
19	cause them; and
20	WHEREAS, organizations like the International Association of Police Chiefs
21	(IACP), the National Sheriffs Association (NSA), the National Conference of
22	Chief Justices (CCJ), and the American Bar Association (ABA) all support bail
23	reform; and
24	WHEREAS, the current Mayor's administration implemented the Violence
25	Intervention Program (VIP), the Rapid Accountability Division (RAD), and the
26	Metro Crime Initiative supported by several current City Councilors; and
27	WHEREAS, the Bernalillo County Criminal Justice Coordinating Council
28	(CJCC) which serves as a forum concerning the law, the legal system, and the
29	administration of justice, to identify issues and their solutions and propose
30	actions, as well as facilitate cooperation that will enhance public safety and
31	reduce crime in Bernalillo County is supported by several current City
32	Councilors; and

	7	door of recidivism on the National, State and Local levels, and urges attention
	8	and support strategies to improve public safety in our communities.
	9	Section 2: The City Council will encourage the provision of additional funding
	10	to support this effort and encourage other agencies to do the same.

	12	to the Chief of the Albuquerque Police Department.
	13	SECTION 3. The City Clerk is directed to send a copy of this Memorial to
	14	each member of the New Mexico State Legislature representing the State
	15	districts in the City of Albuquerque, and the Bernalillo County Commission,
	16	the Chief of the New Mexico State Police Department, the Second Judicial
	17	District Attorney's Office, and the Office of the New Mexico Attorney General.
