	21	WHEREAS, notwithstanding tha	t crime rates in Albuquerque have

	25	WHEREAS, the decision to relea	se a defendant awaiting trial results from

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proceedings where prosecutors carry critical obligations to establish the

1	requisite facts justifying detention, and where the court bears the weighty
2	decision to detain or not detain based on those facts; and
3	WHEREAS, in addition to potential issues with pretrial release, the
4	community has also endured horrific tragedies at the hands of felons in
5	possession of handguns – in 2015, Albuquerque Police Officer Daniel Webster
6	was murdered by a convicted felon with a handgun during a routine traffic
7	stop and Rio Rancho Police Department Officer Gregg "Nigel" Benner was
8	also murdered that same year by a convicted felon with a handgun during a
9	routine traffic stop; and
10	WHEREAS, the New Mexico's Attorney General compiled a report that lays
11	a "holistic" approach to address how systemic gaps in intervention and
12	prevention within the criminal justice system can lead to dangerous criminals
13	being let out of jail without adequate monitoring; and
14	WHEREAS, to address the past problems of catch-and-release bail bond,
15	as of July 2017 new provisions in NM State Rule 403 now provide courts the
16	authority to amend conditions or to revoke pretrial release entirely for
17	defendants who commit new crimes while released when prosecutors meet
18	requisite burdens; and
19	WHEREAS, organizations like the International Association of Police Chiefs
20	(IACP), the National Sheriffs Association (NSA), the National Conference of
21	Chief Justices (CCJ), and the American Bar Association (ABA) all support bail
22	reform; and
23	WHEREAS, the current Mayor's administration implemented the Violence
24	Intervention Program (VIP), the Rapid Accountability Division (RAD), and the
25	Metro Crime Initiative supported by several current City Councilors; and
26	WHEREAS, the City of Albuquerque currently works with a number of
27	diversion programs including Law Enforcement Assisted Diversion (LEAD)
28	and Young Adult Court; and
29	WHEREAS, concerning low-level offenders, there exists the need to
30	increase the use of pre-prosecution diversion programs; and
31	WHEREAS, the aforementioned programs are aiding reform and closing
32	loopholes in the criminal justice system; and

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ı	WHEREAS, for the first six months of 2021, the Albuquerque Police
2	Department reports that preliminary crime statistics indicate that there have
3	been 31,438 crimes; and
4	WHEREAS, sadly this year, the record number of homicides will be
5	surpassed in the City; and
6	WHEREAS, the City of Albuquerque can continue to seek criminal justice
7	reform while also holding repeat violent criminals accountable; and
8	WHEREAS, concerning individuals who commit violent and property
9	crimes with a firearm, these individuals need to be detained, criminally
10	prosecuted and held accountable; and
11	WHEREAS, three Albuquerque Police Officers were recently wounded, one
12	critically, after engaging an armed robber after encountering an out of state
13	felon with a firearm; and
14	WHEREAS, recently, a homicide suspect removed his ankle bracelet and
15	was on the loose without law enforcement being notified; and
16	WHEREAS, the Bernalillo County Criminal Justice Coordinating Council
17	(CJCC) which serves as a forum concerning the law, the legal system, and the
18	administration of justice, to identify issues and their solutions and propose
19	actions, as well as facilitate cooperation that will enhance public safety and
20	reduce crime in Bernalillo County is supported by several current City
21	Councilors.
22	BE IT MEMORIALIZED BY THE COUNCIL, THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE
23	CITY OF ALBUQUERQUE:
24	SECTION 1. The Council reiterates its enduring support for the law
25	enforcement agencies and other agencies that continue to fight the revolving
26	door of recidivism and gun crimes on the National, State and Local levels, and
27	urges attention and support strategies to improve public safety in our
28	communities.
. 29	SECTION 2: The Council urges that personnel be exclusively dedicated to a
30	24/7 comprehensive GPS tracking monitoring system and that the
31	Albuquerque Police Department be notified immediately when a monitored
32	person absconds.
33	SECTION 3: The City Council encourages additional

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violent and property crimes.

1	funding and resources for all organizations within the criminal justice
2	systems, including the prosecutors, public defenders and the courts so that
3	the system can better deal with repeat offenders while continuing to protect
4	the rights of the innocent and all individuals coming before the court.
5	Resources should also specifically be dedicated toward reforming and
6	closing loopholes in the criminal justice system that lead to recidivism and
7	violent criminal firearm use, and that place greater limits on access to deadly
8	weapons by recent violent felons.
9	SECTION 4: The City Council will encourage the provision of additional
10	funding and resources to support the Violence Intervention Program (VIP), the
11	Rapid Accountability Division (RAD), and Law Enforcement Assisted Diversion
12	(LEAD) programs and Young Adult Court, all programs shown to decrease
13	recidivism and to reform the criminal justice system.
14	SECTION 5: The Council strongly encourages the District Attorney,
15	Attorney General and United States Attorney to prosecute and hold
16	accountable individuals who use firearms in the commission of violent and
17	property crimes with sentencing weighted toward the higher ranges of
18	possible prison time.
19	SECTION 6. The Council strongly encourages the District Court to hold
20	accountable those who use firearms in the commission of violent and property
21	crimes with sentencing weighted toward the higher range of possible prison
22	time.
23	SECTION 7. The Council urges the New Mexico State Legislature to pass
24	and close loopholes in the laws for those who use firearms in the commission
25	of violent and property crimes with sentencing weighted toward the higher
26	range of possible prison time.
27	SECTION 8. The Council urges the Governor to support legislation which
28	holds accountable with sentencing weighted toward the higher range of
29	possible prison time individuals who use firearms in the commission of

SECTION 9. The City Clerk is directed to distribute copies of this Memorial to the Chief of the Albuquerque Police Department.

SECTION 10. The City Clerk is directed to send a copy of this Memorial to each member of the New Mexico State Legislature representing the State districts in the City of Albuquerque, the Offices of the Speaker of the House and President Pro Tem of the New Mexico Legislature, and the Bernalillo County Commission, the Chief of the New Mexico State Police Department, the Second Judicial District Attorney's Office, and the Office of the New Mexico Attorney General, as well as the Administrative Office of the Courts.
